Weymouth, Aug. 18. HE 16 instant, came into Portland road, the Heer Van Haen, in the thip the Gauda, mounted with 76 Guns, being Vice-Admiral to de Ruyter; he was separated from the rest of his Company on Saturday last, on the back of the Isle of Wight. He intends to fail for Plymouth, to expect there Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter.

Portsmouth, Aug. 19. There are now at anchor in St. Helens road, fix Dutch Men of War and a Fireship, with about 20 sail of Merchantmen, the Commander in chief is Captain Burchhead, in the ship the Oosterterwycke, mounted with 60 Guns; they are part of de Ruyters Fleet, having been separated by bad weather: they suppose him, and the rest of the Fleet, to be put into some of our Western Ports. These are the ships we told you in our last, were forced to Sea from st. Helens, and had left some Cables and Anchors behind them, which they have fince recovered. The Dutch Officers have been ashore, and very kindly treated by our Deputy-Governor.

Legorn, Aug. 3. By a Barque arrived from Tripoli we have advice, that Sir Fohn Narbrough, with the Men of War under his command lies at present before, and blocks up that City; That there had been lately some alteration in that Government, of which you may expect an account in our next; that those people seemed very much inclined to a Peace with the English, but that Sir John Narbrough infifted to have fatisfaction for what is past: And that the Dragon Frigat had forced ashore a large Tripoline Man of War, which had been formerly their Admiral, that the Men had escaped, but that the English had got the ship off. We hear that the French have taken Bellegarde in Catalonia, and that they are

Masters of the Field there.

Stockholme, July 28. The King and the Senate are frequently affembled; the chief matters before them are about haltening out the Fleet, and sending over the neceffary fuccors into Pomerania. We are told, that orders have been sent to the Governors of the several Provinces of this Kingdom, to exercise in Arms everythird Man, from 16, ro 60 years of age. The latter end of the next month, the General States will assemble here.

Copenhagen, Aug. 3. It was expected that on Saturday last our Fleet would have failed, but it seems the Men of War have not as yet their compleat number of Men, which they expect from Norway; and therefore not to lose time, ten Danish Men of War will for the present join the seven Dutch that are here, and they together will tail in a day or two, under the command of our Admiral Adlacr. The Brandenburgh Envoy that was here, hath taken his leave of the King, and is returned on his way home, very well fatisfied with the affurances of this Court, to remain firm in its Engagements with the Al-lies. Yesterday arrived in the Sound to Durch Monchantmen, and three Men of War for their Convoy; but understanding that many Suedish Capers are abroad, they are somewhat doubtful whether they ought to proceed. The last Week a small Oftend Caper coming towards the Sound, a Luedish Caper stood towards him, and

thought to have taken him, but the Oftender proved too strong, for the Suede took him, and brought him up hither.

Vienna, Aug. 11. We are in great impatience to hear of the Empresses being brought to bed, she being within few dayes of her time. His Imperial Majesty has appointed the Count d' Arch, at present General of the Artillery, in the Army commanded by the Count de. Montecuculi, to be Captain. General of his Forces in the upper Hungary, and the Count de Traffaldo to be General of the Artillery in his stead. In Hungary things are at prefent pretty quiet, insomuch, that its faid the Emperor has fent orders for the march of most of his old Troops towards Bohemia, to form a body about Egra, to act as there may be occasion. Levies are still making in the hereditary Countries for the forming five new Regiments.

Hamburgh, Aug. 23. Yesterday two Danish Vessels manned with 40 Men apiece, attacked a Suedish Man of ten Guns, who lay before Stade, but the Suede was too hard for them, took one of the Veffels, and killed many of their Men in the other. It is faid that 6000

Suedes are marching towards Pomeren.

Stratburgh, Aug. 16. The Imperial Army, under the command of General Montecaculi, is at present encamped at Malsem, having within these three days seized Molsheim, Mutzig, and Ober-Ekenheim, in which were French Garisons, who were forced to surrender upon difa cretion; upon which, the Duke de Duras decamped two days fince from Ichartsheim, in the night, and retreated to Kaftenbolt near schlestadt, the Imperial parties that followed his Rear, having taken above 300 Prisoners. We have advice that the Imperialists have likewise cut off a Convey of 200 Men that were going from Nancy to the French Army with a 100 Wagons laden with Corn, General Montecuculi hath and two with money. demanded several Boats of this City, for the making a Bridge over the Rhine. We are told that the faid General has resolved to attack Haguenam and Saverne, both at a time.

Ditto, Aug. 19. The 17 inftant General Montecuculi decamped from Giockelsberg, where he had his quarters and this day he is passed with his Army in fight of this City, towards Haguenam, whither the Troops of the Circles, in conjunction with 4000 Imperialits, under the command of the Prince of Baden, advanced before. and, as we hear, have already formally befreged Hague. nam; we were told that Saverne would be attacked at the fame time, but the Imperialists have contented themselves to invest that place, till such time as Haguenaw is taken, and then Saverne will be likewife attacked in the firmes. The French Army continues at Kastenholtz near Sehlefladt.

Gologne, Aug. 20. The 18 inftant, arrived here the Princesses Dowagers of Nassaw and Simmeren, and this morning they are paried again towards Dieft. The Letters from Lipstadt of the 17 instant, tell us, That the Troops of the Elector of Brandenburgh did not as yet flir; and that those of the Bishop of Munster continued in the Countrey of Lenge, expecting that the King
