A PROCLAMATION,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majest's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for dis-covering fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

GEORGE R. HEREAS for the speedy Manning Our Fleet, We did, by Our Royal Procla-mation bearing Date the 22d Day of July last, Promise and Deciare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman. thousd be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinar Seaman, not above the Ase of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the 12th Day of September then following, enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Licutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as should be employed for Raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy ; and that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings fhould be paid to every Able bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; who should, on or before the faid 12th Day of September, in like Manner, voluntarily enter themselves to ferve in Our Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person, who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who should secret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our taid Service : Which faid Bounties and Rewards have been continued by Our Orders in Council from the faid 12th Day of September to the 31ft Day of last Month. And whereas many Men are full wanting to compleat the Complements of Our Ships now fitting cu. for Sea, We do therefore hereby Promise and Declare, That, for the better Encouragement of all Inch Seamen, Seafaring Man, and Ablebodied Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themfelves into Our Service, the Bounties of Six Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, he paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, voluntarily enter themtelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Oar Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for Raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shil-lings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who shall, on or before the faid 91ft Day of March next, voluntarily enter themfelves in like Manner to ferve in Our Royal Navy; And that fuch respective Sums be paid to all fuch Seamen and Landmen immediately upon their Entring, by the Officers, employed in Raifing Men for Our Fleet, with whom fuch Seamen and Landmen shall respectively enter. And we do further Promise and Declare, That a Reward of Five Pounds for every Able, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman shall be paid to any Perfon who shall dilcover any Seaman or Seamen who may fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seamon or Seamon Shall be taken for Our faid Service on or before she fuid

as a Day of March next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raifing Men; the faid Rewards to be peid for any Seeman or Seamen fo difcovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Committioners of our Navy; and at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Cuftoms, immediately upon a Certi-ficate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Committioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers; or Collectors of Our Cultoms respectively, by the Perfon who may make Difcovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Scamen pocured in Confequence of his Difcovery ; and the taid Cortificate to be given by fuch Officer as may take fuch Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

The humble Address of the Ministers of the Confociated Churches of the Colony of Connecticutt, convened in General Affociation at Hartford, June 16, 1761.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-W jects, the Ministers of the Confociated Churches of the Colony of Connecticutt in New England, most humbly beg Leave to take this Opportunity, at our first General Convention fince your Majefty's Accession to the Throne, to express our deep Sense of the unspeakable Loss your Majesty, your Kingdoms, and these remote Parts of your Dominions, have suffained by the Death of His late Majefty your Royal Grandfather; and with the fincerest Joy to congratulate your Majesty's happy and peaceable Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors.

The Happiness of His late Majesty's wife and auspicious Government, so sensibly felt in every Part of His Dominions, and the critical Situation of Affairs of Europe, made all good Men, among His Subjects, follicitous for the Continuance of the important Life of your Royal Grandfather; and His fudden Removal would have filled His faithful Subjefts with much greater Anxiety, had not your Majefty's Succeffion to the Crown dispelled their Fears, and opened the most pleasing Prospect of the Con-tinuance of all the Bleffings that can be expected from the Government of the best of Kings.

Your Majefty afcends the Throne amidit the Difficulties and Uncertainties of War.
