Petersbourg, February 5, N. S.
PRINCE George of Holstein Eutin arrived here on Wednesday Evening, having been met by the Emperor at Krufazelo, a Place Twenty Miles off. His Highness is lodged at the Chamberlain Shuwalow's House, where a Table is kept for him, and he is served by the Emperor's Livery. He receives the greatest Marks of Distinction from their Imperial Majesties, and is daily attended by the Emperor's Officers. The Princess his Consort is soon expected here; and in the mean Time, the Empress has been pleased to send her the Order of St. Catherine, which her Imperial Majesty has likewise conferred upon the young Princess, Daughter of the Veldt Marechal Prince of Holstein Beck. The Duke of Courland, with his Family, Veldt Marechal Munich, and his Son M. Lestock, and all the other Exiles, are recalled, Count Bestuchef only excepted, who is still a Prisoner at large in one of his own Villages.

This Day the Body of the late Empress is laid out under a Canopy of State, in one of the Great Halls of the Palace: Upon this Occasion the Court have put on their deep Mourning. Some Day in this Month will be fixed for the Ceremony of the Interment. The Emperor has given Directions, that, in the Procession, the Three Branches of the Nariskins, of whole Family the Emperor Peter the Great's Mother was, and the Counts Shawrowsky, Ephimofsky, and Henrikow, Nephews to the Empress Catherine, shall walk in the Procession, not according to their Rank, but as Persons who have the Honour to be related to the Imperial Family.

Dr. Moussey, an Englishman, one of the Body Physicians to the late Empress, is promoted to the Place of Archiater, and Chancellor of Medicine, with the Title of Privy Councillor, and the Rank of Lieutenant General.

Lieutenant Colonel Klefeldt set out on Tuesday Evening, with Orders to Lieutenant General Count Czernichew to leave Silesia; and repass the Oder with the Body of Troops under his Command.

Petersbourg, Feb. 16. The Emperor goes on doing Good to Particulars, and to his whole People; and his last Act of abolishing the private Chancery, or Inquisition of State, is looked upon as the greatest Blessing that could have happened to the Nation.

The Prussian General Werner arrived here the 12th Instant, and has received the greatest Marks of Distinction from the Emperor, particularly that of passing through most of the Streets of Petersbourg in the Coach with his Imperial Majesty.

Copenhagen, Feb. 27. The King of Denmark is perfectly recovered, but does not yet appear in Publick, upon Account of the Severity of the Weather. The Hereditary Princess is indisposed; and the Prince Royal, the two youngest Princesses, and Prince Frederick of Hesse Cassel, are ill of the Measles; but all likely to do well. That Distemper continues to rage here in a very unusual Manner.

Copenhagen, March 6. The King of Denmark appeared Yesterday in Publick for the first Time since his Indisposition; and all the Royal Family are now happily recovered.

Magdebourg, March 2. By Letters from Breslau of the 20th, we hear, that the Russian Brigadier Howtowitz, being arrived there, was extremely well

received by his Prussian Majesty; and that on the 21st there was to be a Feast given by the King, in Honour of the Birth-day of the Emperor of Russia Peter the Third.

Magdebourg, March 6. Prince Wolkoufsky, Commander of the Russian Troops in Pomerania, has received Orders from the Emperor to agree to a general Armistice between the Russian and Prussian Armies in Silesia, as well as in Pomerania; and to set at Liberty all the Prussian Prisoners without Ransom.

Mentz, March 5. Orders have been lately received by those who are employed by France in forming the Magazines and in purchasing Forage for the Lower Rhine, to suspend buying Forage, Provisions, &c. which occasions various Speculations, as the Magazines of Wesel are not provided with Stores, Ammunition, Provisions, Forage, &c. for subsisting an Army one Month.

Dusseldorff, March 7. The Equipages, Servants, and all the Provisions, which prince Soubize left here last November, are now embarked on Boats to be sent towards Mentz; which makes it probable, he will have the Command of the Army in Hesse.

Brunswick, March 9. The Dutchess Dowager, Mother of the Queens of Denmark, and Prussia, and of the Reigning Duke of Brunswick, died here last Saturday, at Seven in the Evening. Prince Ferdinand, her fourth Son, arrived here from the Army a few Hours before her Death.

Brunswick, March 12. The Funeral of her late Serene Highness the Dutchess Dowager, is fixed for Monday next.

Hambourg, March 12. M. de Goltze, whom his Prussian Majesty has sent to Petersbourg to make his Compliments of Felicitation to the new Emperor, upon his Accession to the Throne of Russia, had already passed Konigberg, and hoped to arrive at Petersbourg the 26th of last Month.

Hague, March 9. Letters from Stettin mention, that the Emperor of Russia has not only ratified the eventual Armistice, which the Prince of Bevern had agreed upon with the Prince of Wolkoufsky, commanding the Russian Troops in Pomerania; but had sent a full Power to the latter, to make such Arrangement with the Prince of Bevern, as to put a total Stop to Hostilities in Poland, and Silesia, as well as in Pomerania.

Hague, March 16. We hear from Vienna, that General Czernichew had quitted that Place abruptly, recalled all the Russian Officers from Prague, and immediately upon his Arrival at the Army, begun his March towards the Vistula.

The French Garrison at Gottingen detached 4000 Men, on the 9th Instant, to attack the Chain of the Allied Army. They marched to the Posts of Gittel, and Kahlfeldt, in Hopes of carrying them off; but they having retired in Time, the Rear Guard only of that at Gittel was attacked, and lost a few Men. The Enemy withdrew again the next Day to Gottingen.

By Letters received from Capt. Denis, of His Majesty's Ship the Bellona, there is an Account, that on the 1st Instant he fell in with and took a French Snow Privateer, of 12 Guns, and 120 Men, returning from her Cruize to Bayonne.



And that on the 17th of last Month he had taken a Snow from Martinico, laden with Sugar.

Captain Byron, of His Majesty's Ship the Fame, in Company with the Lyon, has also taken the Aimable Marie, of 250 Tons, from Bourdeaux, bound to St. Domingo, with Wine and Provisions, which they fell in with on the 5th of last Month: And on the 12th they retook the Telemachus, an English Ship belonging to Guernsey, homeward bound from Carolina, of 250 Tons, and 12 Guns, which had been taken on the 1st by a French Privateer. The same Day they fell in with and took the Foudroyant, a Vessel belonging to Bourdeaux, bound likewise to St. Domingo, of about 450 Tons, with a Letter of Marque, her Cargo consisting of Wine, Provisions, and some dry Goods.
