Most gracious Sovereign,

But whatever our Enemies may think of it, we trust in God, that this Success will enable your Majesty so to distress them, as to oblige them to flee to your Majesty for Peace, and to make such Concessions as your Majesty, in your great Wisdom, shall think consistent with your Glory, adequate to the great Expence of Blood and Treasure they have occasioned to us, and necessary for the Preservation of the Rights, Honour and Trade of your Dominions, from all future Violations. And we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we will cheerfully contribute, to the utmost of our Abilities, to support your Majesty's Endeavours to these Ends.
