

The following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgeſſes and Principal Inhabitants of Falmouth in the County of Cornwall, has been preſented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viſcount Falmouth, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleaſed to receive very graciouſly.

To the King's moſt Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgeſſes and Principal Inhabitants of the Town of Falmouth in the County of Cornwall.

WE your Majesty's moſt dutiful and loyal Subjects moſt humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the auspicious Birth of the Prince, the Hereditary Duke of this County; and to this glorious Event, to add our hearty Congratulations alſo on the late ſignal Succes of your Majesty's Arms, in the great and important Conqueſt of the the Havannah and the Spaniſh Fleet there: And we pray, that the Almighty may bleſs and preſerve your Sacred Majesty and your Royal Confort; and alſo the Prince, that he may live to be the Glory of your Majesty's moſt Auguſt Houſe, and a Bleſſing to this Nation, and that your Majesty may triumph over all your Enemies.

Given under our Common Seal of the ſaid Town, the 28th Day of October, 1762, and in the 3d Year of your Majesty's Reign.

Petersburg, October 12 We received Yeſterday the agreeable News of her Imperial Majesty's Coronation on the 3d Inſtant, at Moſcow, and that the Ceremony was conducted with the greateſt Order and Magnificence.

There were ſeveral Promotions upon that Occaſion, the Particulars of which are not exactly known, except that the Three Brothers Orloff are created Counts; and it is further ſaid, the Court is to return hither this Winter.

Hague, November 5. A Courier is juſt arrived here, from Saxony, with the News of a complete Victory obtained the 29th paſt, near Freyberg, by Prince Henry of Prussia, over the United Armies of Auſtrians and Imperialiſts, under the Command of the Prince de Stolberg, in the Abſence of General Haddick, who was gone to Dresden. His Royal Highneſs attacked the Enemy at Day-break, and the Action laſted till Two in the Afternoon, when the Enemy was entirely routed, and obliged to quit the Field of Battle, and the Town of Freyberg, to the Pruffians; who took beſides from 5 to 6000 Priſoners, 30 Cannons, and ſeveral Colours and Standards. What made the Circumſtances of this Battle, according to the above Account, ſo much the more glorious, were, that Prince Henry had with him a Part only of his Troops; the Corps under General Hulſen having only made ſome Movements to facilitate the Operations of his Royal Highneſs; and the Reinforcement under the Count de Neuwid having gotten no farther the Day of the Battle than the Neighbourhood of Groſſenhayn.

Some Letters from Tarreda, the Spaniſh Camp in the Kingdom of Portugal, dated the 13th paſt, mention, that the Difficulty of making the Roads paſſable for their Artillery, and the great Scarcity of Forage between that Place and Abrantes, kept them ſtill in the ſame Situation, having Villa Velha on their Left, Sebrea Formoſa in the Front, and the Main Body of their Army at Tarreda.

St. James's, November 12.

This Day arrived here Capt. Gu-dickens, ſent Expreſs by Prince Ferdinand of Brunſwick, to His Majesty, with the News of the Surrender of Caſſel to Prince Ferdinand, on the 1ſt Inſtant, upon the following Articles of Capitulation.

Article I. The Garrifon ſhall go out with the Honours of War, their Arms, and Baggages, Drums beating, lighted Match, to be conducted by the neareſt Road to the King's Army.

Granted. Thursday Morning.

Art. II. The Sick from the Hoſpitals, with the Effects thereto belonging, ſhall have free Liberty to depart, and Carriages or Boats ſhall be furniſhed them gratis for this Evacuation, as the Sick and Wounded ſhall be in Condition to be transported to the King's Army.

The Hoſpitals may have free Liberty to go out with their Effects, but the Carriages ſhall not be furniſhed gratis.

Art. III. The Artillery, and all the Royal Effects, ſhall be transported to the King's Army by Boats or Carriages of the Country gratis.

No. In Favour of the gallant Defence, I grant two Pieces of Cannon, 12 Pounders, and one 4 Pounder, for Baron Dieſbach, Commandant of Caſſel.

Art. IV. Covered Carriages and Boats ſhall be furniſhed, to transport the Equipages, and Agents, which ſhall not be viſited.

Granted.

Art. V. The Treasuſer of the Troops, the Agent Victuallers, and others, ſhall go out with their Effects and Papers, without any Impediment.

Granted.

Art. VI. The Garrifon ſhall be furniſhed with Bread, Proviſion, and Forage, every one gratis, according to his Rank, till their Arrival at the King's Army.

The Garrifon ſhall provide themſelves with Bread, and Forage, but ſhall pay for it on their March.

Art. VII. All the Effects, belonging to the King's Officers and Troops, may be freely carried off with them, or ſent after them.

Granted.

Art. VIII. When the Capitulation ſhall be ſigned, Leave ſhall be given to ſend an Officer to the Marſhals to acquaint them with it.

Granted.

Art. IX. The Garrifon ſhall be eſcorted by a proper Detachment.

Granted.

Art. X. The Boatmen too, Victuallers, and other Subjects of the King, ſhall have free Liberty of going out with their Effects, on paying the Debts they may have contracted in the City.

Granted.

Capitulation for the Hoſpitals.

Article I. There ſhall be reſerved out of the King's Proviſions, remaining at Caſſel, Three Hundred Sacks of Flour, each weighing 200 Pounds, Twenty Oxen, and a Hundred Sheep, for the Conſumption of the ſaid Hoſpitals.

Granted.

Art. II.
