

non; he hath orders to raise a Fort there on the side of the Rhine; and to lay a Bridge over it; in the mean time, the Imperial Army is expected at Landau, where it will continue till the said Bridge is finished. The Prince of Lorraine is gone towards the Saar, to take possession of the Troops which now belong to him, as Sovereign Duke of Lorraine.

Ditto, Sept. 23. The Imperial Army is about Weissemburg, but in the interim, we remain wholly ignorant of Montecuculi's design. From Heidelberg they write, That the Elector Palatin is much offended that a report hath been spread abroad of his having made a Truce with the Garrison of Philipsburg. The young Duke of Lorraine is gone towards the Saar, to take possession of the Troops belonging to the late Duke his Uncle. The Prince of Conde sends several parties into the lower Alsatia, and some have appeared near this City. It is reported that he hath caused Haguenaw and Saverne to be evacuated, and the Magazines that were there, to be removed to Brisac.

Cologne, Sept. 24. The Lunenburg Forces continue in their quarters at Meckenheim, about four Leagues from hence, and as yet we do not hear of any intention they have to remove from thence. Two thousand Lunenburg Horse under the command of the Count de Lippe, are marching to the Meuse, to join the Dutch Troops that are there.

Ditto, Sept. 27. Yesterday the Lunenburg and Osna-brug Forces decamped and marched to Lommersheim, about a League from Erpen, where they will continue two or three days, and then go into their winter quarters, in this Diocess, and in the Countrey of Juliers. In the mean time 2000 Horse of these Forces are marched under the command of the Count de Lippe, towards Ruremond, on the Meuse, where its thought, they may arrive this day or to morrow.

Ruremond, Sept. 28. This day we expect here the Lunenburg Horse that come from Cologne, they having lodged yesterday at Erkelens. Here are at present nine Dutch Regiments of Foot, and one of Horse, and one more we expect from Venlo; the Wagons stand all ready, being laden with Ammunition, Meal, Bisket, and other Provisions. To morrow they will march from hence.

Brussels, Sept. 27. The 25 instant, the Prince of Orange, and the Duke de Villa Hermosa decamped, the first having his quarters at the Abby of Ramee, and his Excellency at Turrebaix les Beguines, and that night the Army encamped at Fauche; the weather was very wet the whole day, which greatly incommoded the Soldiers in their march, and indeed the winter season comes on so fast, that we can with little reason expect any farther Action. The French Army observes the Prince very close, and is at present lodged about Sombrefe Abby. At the coming away of our Letters yesterday in the evening, from our Army, there was an allurum, that 1500 French were come within half a League of our Camp, upon which, Count Egmond was sent out with 2000 Horse to look after them. The next remove of our Army will be towards Tillemont, where the Count de Horne with the Train of Artillery at present is, The Dutch Troops are still at Ruremond, and 2000 Lunenburg Horse are on their march towards them. From Luxemburg of the 22 instant, they write, That the Lorraine Troops were at Vaudrefange, on the Saar, and that the young Duke of Lorraine, who succeeds his Uncle, was arrived there from the Imperial Army, and had been acknowledged by them, they having taken the Oath of Fidelity to him. It is believed, that the Duke

will march with them into Alsatia, and join them with the Imperial Army.

Ditto, Octob. 1. Our Army continues in the same quarters we told you in our last; the Prince of Orange has his at Hanau, and the Duke de Villa Hermosa at Ortle g and. The bad weather comes on so fast, that the Armies will not be able to continue much longer in the Field. On Friday last parted a great Convoy from Charles of with Provisio to the French Army, which is at present not from Peues. We are somewhat troubled to hear, that instead of the whole Lunenburg Army which we expected, 2000 Horse are only marching to the Meuse.

Paris, Sept. 28. Our last Letters from Alsatia, are dated the 23 instant; they say, That the Parties which the Prince of Conde had sent out to learn an account of the Enemies motions, had brought advice, That the 20 instant, the Imperial Army was at Bellingen near Landau, and that General Montecuculi had given orders for the making a Bridge over the Rhine at Lanterburg. The Prince of Conde's Army begins now to be in a pretty good posture again, most of his Cavalry that had lost their Horses, being remounted, and several recruits being arrived from Lorraine and Burgundy, so that we expect the Prince will suddenly leave his Camp, and march towards the Enemy, who, it is said, to give the Elector Palatine some satisfaction, intends to raise several Forts about Philipsburg, and by that means block it up. We are told, that the Elector Palatine has made a Truce with the Garrison of Philipsburg for three weeks. From Catalonia they write, That the Marschal de Schomberg advancing with some Troops to turn a Rivulet which runs into Puicorda, 600 Horse of that Garrison came out and engaged him, but were beaten back into the Town with considerable loss.
