# A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

W Hereas a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us, the Most Chri " " flian King, and the King of Spain, to which the "King of Portugal hath acceded, hath been con-" cluded at Paris on the Tenth Day of February " last, and the Ratifications thereof have been ex-"changed upon the Tenth Day of this Inflant "March; In Conformity thereunto, We have " thought fit hereby to Command, that the fame be published throughout all Our Dominions : And " We do declare, to all Our loving Subjects, Our " Will and Pleafure, That the faid Treaty of Peace " and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by " Sea as Land, and in all Places what foever ; strictly " Charging and Commanding all our loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform " themfelves therunto accordingly."

And whereas His Majefty hath fignified His Royal Pleasure, That the faid Proclamation be forthwith Published in this Kingdom, in the usual Manner; we the Lords Juffices in Obedience to His Majefty's faid Commands, do hereby Publish His Majesty's faid Royal Proclamation accordingly, ftrictly Charging and Commanding all His Majetty's loving Sub-jects to take Notice thereof, and to conform themfelves according to the Tenor of the faid Proclamation.

Given at His Majefty's Caffle of Dublin, the 28th Day of March, 1763.

## Dublin Cafile, March 30.

'This Day His Majefty's Proclamation of Peace was made in the following Manner :

HE Officers of Arms, with the Serjeants at Arms and Trumpeters, mounted their Horfes at College Green, and proceeded from thence, accompanied by a Squadron of Dragoons to Corke Hill, where the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, attended : And Uliter King of Arms having prefented to his Lordship a Warrant from the Lords Juffices for Proclaiming the Peace, the Procession was made to the Castle as follows:

A Party of Dragoons to clear the Way; Lord Mayor's Leading Coach; City Officers; State Trumpeters and Kettle Drummer; Purfuivants, Athlone Pursuivant at Arms, Serjeants at Arms King of Arms; City Marshal; Mace Bearer, Sword Bearer, and Sheriffs on Horfeback ; the Lord Mayor in his Coach, the City Guards walking on each Side of it, followed by the Aldermen in their Coaches, attended by a Squadron of Dragoone. When they came to the Caftle, the Lord Mayor went to the Foot of the Great Stairs, where he prefented the City Sword (drawn) to their Excellencies the Lords Juffices, who sheathed it, and returned it to the Lord Mayor, before whom it was carried during

the Ceremony: They then returned to the Caftle after the Serjeant Trumpeter had Gate, where, unded a Call thrice. Athlone Purluivant m de an O Yez thrice, and Uifter King of orms read His Mujefty's Proclamation. In this Method the Pro-reflion was made to the Tholfel, Corn Masket, the Old B idge, Ormoud Bridge, and Effex Bridge; at which Places the Proclamation was read by Ulfter in the fame Manner. They then returned to the Cafile, and the Lord Mayor was conducted by Ulfler, and the reft of the State Officers, to the Pretence-Chamber, when his Lordship acquainted their Excellencies, that the King of Arms had published the Proclamation in the usual Places of the City. Then their Excellencies drank His Majefty's Health : At which Time the Great Guns in the Park fired three Rounds of twenty one Guns. At each Place, where the Proclamation was made, the Spectators expressed their Satisfaction on the Occasion, by loud Acclamations. The State Officers and the Squadron conducted the Lord Mayor to the Mayoralty House, where they all drank the King's Health ; and the Evening was concluded with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and other Demonstrations of Joy.
