THEREAS by an Act made in the laft Seffion of Parliament, intituled, " An " A& for the further Improvement of " His Majefty's Revenue of Cuftoms; " and for the Encouragement of Officers making " Seizures ; and for the Prevention of the clan-" define Running of Goods into any Part of His " Majelty's Dominions, it is, amongst other Things. Enacled, That for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all fuch Ships and Veffels of War belonging to His Majefty, His Heirs, and Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coafts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, One Moiety of the Nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Veffels and prohibited Goods, which shall be so feized after the First Day of May, 1763, and condemned and fold according to Law, (the Charges whereof being first deducted) shall be vested in the faid Officers and Seamen ; and His Majefty is thereby empowered to caufe the fame to be divided amongst the faid Officers and Seamen, in fuch Proportions, and in fuch Manner, as His Majefly, His Heirs, and Succeffors, fhall thick fit to order and direct. by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations, to be made or iffued, from Time to Time, for that Purpofe ; and His Majefty is likewife empowered by the faid Act. to make a Diffribution of any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that shall be made by such Officers and Seamen respectively ; the Money arising by the Sale of which other Part is directed by the faid Act to be paid into the Exchequer. His MajeRy, taking the fame into His Roval Confideration, is hereby pleafed. purfuant to the Powers vested in Him by the faid Act, and by and with the Advice of His Privy Courcil, to order, direct, and appoint, That the Moiety of Seizures, granted by the faid Act to the Officers and Seamen as aforefaid, be divided in the following Proportions ; videlicet,

1ft, With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Ships and Sloops of War.

To the Captain or Captains of any fuch Ships or Sloops, who fhall be actually on Board at the Seizure of any Smurgling Veffel, or prohibited Goods, Three Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces. Sea Lieutenants and Maffers, on Board any fuch Ships or Sloops, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; 'to the Licutenants and Quarter Mafters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enligns, and Quarter Mafters of Land Forces, Boatswain. Gunner, Purfer, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any fuch Ships or Sloops. One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; To the Midschipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master

To the Clerk and Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate, on Board any fuch Cutter, One Eighth Part; To the Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and all other Perfons, doing Duty and affifting on Board any fuch Cutter, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

3d, With Regard to Seizures made by Ships or Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all fuch Cafes, the Mciety which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into fo many equal Parts, or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops, and Cutters concerned therein, and that those Shares be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops, and Cutters, according to the aforegoing Proportions.

And His Majefty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in Cafe any Seizures shall be made in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majefty's Ships or Veffels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commo-dore, with a Captain under him, fuch Flag Officer or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moiety of the faid Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer ; And in Cafe any Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any fuch Ship or Veffel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be abfent at the Time of making fuch Seizure, the Share of fuch Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Car-penter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cox. other Perfons doing Duty or affifting on Board any Inch

fuch Ship or Veffel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any fuch Ship or Sloops, at the Time of making fuch Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovementioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their re-spective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majelty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to caule His Majesty's Pleasure, hereby fignified, to be duly complied with.
