To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Nobility, Freeholders and Heretors of the Shire of Edinburgh.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's faithful Subjects beg Leave to approach your Majesty with Hearts impressed with a lively Sense of the Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Government: And particularly we acknowledge, with the warmest Gratitude, your Majesty's Goodness in restoring, upon Honourable and Advantageous Terms, the inestimable Blessing of Peace, so necessary to these Nations, exhausted by a long, bloody, and expensive War, whose Rage has extended to all the Quarters of the Globe, Providence has, during the late War, blessed the British Arms with the most astonishing Success; and that Period will ever remain peculiarly distinguished in the Annals of Europe.

Whilst the Bulk of Mankind are affected with what strikes their Imagination, the more rational and thinking Part will receive a much higher Satisfaction from the Contemplation of your Majesty's Prudence and Moderation. These Virtues determined your Royal Wisdom, even in the highest Flow of Success, to seize the proper Opportunity of putting an End to the Calamities of Mankind by a Peace, which, from many Circumstances, promises to be as solid and lasting, as it is reasonable and just.

We cannot therefore reflect on our present happy Situation, without feeling our Hearts animated with the warmest Zeal for your Majesty's Person, and, at the same Time, filled with the utmost Abhorrence of all Disrespect to your Dignity.

That your Majesty may be blessed with a Continuation of every publick and private Comfort, and may long reign in the Hearts of a free and a happy People, are our sincere and ardent Wishes.
