3d, With Regard to Seizures made by Ships or I Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.

That in all fuch Cafes, the Molety which is given to the Officers and Men who fhall make fuch Seizare, be divided into fo many equal Farts, or Shares, as there may be Ships or Sloops, and Currers concerned therein, and that those Shares be diffributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships or Sloops, and Cutters, according to the aforegoing Proportions.

And His Majefty doth hereby further order, direct, and appoint, That in Cafe any Seizures shall be made in any of the Colonies Abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, by His Majefty's Ships or Vesiels, being Part of the Squadron, or acting under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commo dore, with a Captain under him, fuch Flag Officer or Commodore, shall have One Fourth Part of the other Moioty of the faid Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of His Majefty's Exchequer : And in Cate any Sca Captain, Inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Othcers, belonging to any fuch Ship or Veffel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be ab fent at the Time of making fuch Scizure, the Share of fuch Sea Captain, Inferior Commission or War-rant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swalber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Perfons doing Duty or affifting on Board any fuch Ship or Veffel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers, on Board of any fuch Ship or Sloops, at the Time of mairing fuch Seizures, fhall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share, which, according to the abovemen-tioned Diffribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasury, and the Lords Committioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Majesty's Pleasure, hereby fignified, to be duly complied with.
