WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Freeholders, Justices of the Peace and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Selkirk, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the many illustrious Events, which have, in so signal a Manner, adorned and distinguished the first Years of your auspicious Reign. Animated by the Sentiments of a Moderation truly magnanimous, you manifested, even in the Midst of Victory, the earliest Disposition to terminate, by a reasonable Accommodation, the Calamities of the most extensive and chargeable War, in which your Kingdoms had ever been involved. But when your gracious Intentions were rendered ineffectual, by the Obstinacy of an Enemy elated by the Accession of a new and powerful Ally, such was the Wisdom of your Councils, and such the Vigour of your Arms, that by the well-concerted and successful Operations of one Campaign, you compelled your united Enemies to accept Terms of Peace more Honourable and Advantageous to your Crown and Kingdoms than those which had been so lately rejected.
