Notice is hereby given, pursuant to the Statute made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, entitled, An Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry, That John Nutter, of the Parish of King Sumborne in the County of Southampton, Labourer, was assaulted and robbed on Friday the Twenty-third Day of December last, between the Hours of Three and Four of the Clock in the Afternoon, on the King's Highway leading from Samy Down Farm in the said Parish of Kings Sumborne to Little Sumborne, as he was Travelling along the same near to a Coppice called Winterdowne Coppice, in the Hundred of Kings Sumborne in the said County, of three Guineas and eleven Half Guineas, one Portugal Piece of Gold Coin called a Half Moidore, value Thirteen Shillings and Six Pence, one other Piece of Portugal Gold Coin, value Nine Shillings, and also of Sixteen Shillings and Two Six-pences in Silver, which he had in a White Canvas Purse in his Pocket, by Two Men on Foot, the one a middle-sized Man, in a Snuff-coloured Coat, with a White Handkerchief or Napkin over his Forehead, who asked the said John Nutter if he had seen Mathews the Spinning-mar; and on Nutter's answering No, said, we have missed him, and we will have you; you have Money about you, for you have been Collecting of Wood-Money; which Nutter denying, immediately received from the above Person a Blow on his Left Arm with a large long Stick, which occasioned a Struggle between them; when the other Man threw something over Nutter's Neck, and held him back whilst the Man, who first assaulted him, took out of his Pocket the above White Canvas Purse containing the above Coin.

Pursuant to the Act of Parliament made for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry—William Evans, of Brackley in the County of Northampton, Labourer, Collector of the Tolls at Hoppersford Gate on the Turnpike Road leading through Brackley aforesaid, gives this Notice, That on Monday the 2d Day of this instant January 1764, about a Quarter of an Hour after Eleven of the Clock in the Morning, near a Place called Plummers Furze (and which he believes to be in the Parish of Evenly in the Hundred of Kings Sutton in the said County of Northampton) he was assaulted by a Tall Lusty Man, wearing a brown or mixed coloured Horseman's Coat, and flapped Hat, having a Scar on the left Side of his upper Lip, and mounted on a brown Gelding with a brown Muffell, and was by him robbed of the Sum of Six Pounds Nineteen Shillings and Ten Pence Three Farthings, as he was carrying the same to the Treasurer of the said Turnpike, and was the Money taken by him for Tolls at the Turnpike Gate aforesaid.
