To which they were introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Harcourt, Lord Chamberlain to Her Majesty; and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, February 28, 1764.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, that on Wednesday the 15th Day of this Instant February, Matthew Delohanty, an Irish Chairman, and several other wicked and ill-disposed Persons, riotously assembled before the House of his Excellency the Morocco Ambassador, in Panton Square, Piccadilly, and most audaciously broke open the Outer Door of the said House, and forcibly entered the same, and were guilty of great Outrages therein, in Violation of the Rights and Privileges of Ambassadors, and in open Defiance of His Majesty and His Laws; for which Offences, a Bill of Indictment has been since found by the Grand Jury of the County of Middlesex, against the said Matthew Delohanty, and Five of his Accomplices, who have been apprehended, and are now in Custody; but the said Matthew Delohanty, and some other of the Offenders, abscond, and are fled from Justice: His Majesty for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Persons concerned in the said audacious Riot and Violence, is hereby pleased to offer a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to such Person or Persons, who shall apprehend the said Matthew Delohanty, and bring him before any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, so that he may be proceeded against and brought to Justice, and a suitable Reward to any Person or Persons, who shall in like Manner apprehend any other of the Offenders not yet taken, to be paid by Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; Solicitor to His Majesty's Treasury: And if any one of the said Offenders now at large, except the said Matthew Delohanty, will surrender himself, and give Information against any other of the Offenders now at large, so that he or they may be apprehended, he or they shall receive all fitting Encouragement.

"with gun Powder for You and the first opertunety  
"we have we will shoot You and if we cannot Lite of  
"You, We will go up to the Bord all hands of Us  
"and will not streke a Stroke in the Yard tell You  
"are turned out of it for revenged we will be  
"for You are like the rich Man wich refused to

"give Iazarus the Crums which fell from his tabel  
"we cannot compare You to any thing ells"

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Sending the said anonymous threatening Letter to the said Mr. Allin, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover him, or her Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

His Majesty's Post-master General having been pleased to establish Three Packet-Boats, at Falmouth, of 150 Tons and 18 Hands each, for the Conveyance of Mails, Expresses and Passengers, to Barbadoes, Grenada, St. Christopher's, Jamaica, Penfacola, St. Augustine, Savannah, Charles-Town, and back to Falmouth.

The first Mail will be dispatched from this Office on the 23d of February next; the second on the 12th of April; the third on the 14th of June; and upon the Return of every Packet, Notice will be given, when the next Mail is to be dispatched from hence, which is calculated for once in two Months, or thereabout.

The Postage of all Letters and Packets sent from London, must be paid upon their Delivery into this Office; the Inland Postage to London, from all Places in Great Britain or Ireland, must also be paid, over and above the said Rates.

The Postage from London to His Majesty's Islands in the West-Indies, is at the Rate of 1s. 6d. for a single Letter; to the whole Continent of America, including Florida, at 1s. per Letter, the double, treble and Ounce Letters and Packets in Proportion; the like Rates will be charged in Return, at this Office, upon the Letters and Packets coming from those Places respectively.

All Letters for any of His Majesty's Islands in the West Indies, not herein mentioned, may be directed by the Way of Barbadoes, Grenada, or St. Christopher's; and if not so directed, they will be left at St. Christopher's, to be forwarded from thence as Occasion may offer.
