Naples, Octob. 10.

HE Armada, consisting in 17 Men of War, continues at Palermo, the Prince of Monte-sefarchio, the Admiral resolving to avoid all Engagements with the Enemies Fleets, till fuch time as Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter be joined with him. The Prisoners that were brought here some days since in a Felucca from Reggio, have been put several times to the Torture, but without any effect; for they have not confessed any thing, which may argue them of having held private correspondence with the Enemy. Our Viceroy has not accepted the Present, usually made by this City to the Viceroy, at the entring upon the Government; but has ordered the same to be applied for the publick service of the Kingdom in this Conjunction,

Warfaw,Olfob, 22. Though we have not any very good news from Leopol, for the Turks according to our last advices, continue to press the siege of Trembowla, with so great application, that they take from his Majesty all opportunity of putting any fuccors into the place; yet leveral reports are spread abroad, which, if true, willin a very great measure relieve this Kingdom, in the ill posture it is at present. It is faid, That the Czar of Moscovy has given politive orders to his Generals, to march forthwith with what Force they can assemble, to the assistance of the King, and that in the mean time, provision be made to bring a more powerful Army in the Field against Spring. Some have given out, that his Majesty has at length suffered himself to be perswaded to be Crowned in January next, that so a Dyet may be held, and such resolutions taken there, as are necessary for the peace and fafety of the Kingdom. And in the mean time, we hear, that the Gentry are delirous that the King would call the Arrear-Ban, that his Majesty may not be left with a handful of Men, exposed to the great numbers of the Enemies, as he is at present.

Madrid, Odlob, 26. The Letters we receive this week from Catalonia inform us, that the Duke of Schomberg was going to put his Troops into Winter-quarters, to that all action will likewife cease on that The Duke de St. Germain upon the arrival of his successor the Marquis de Seralue, will immediately repair to Court, to give her Majetty an account of the polture of affairs in those parts. Some have said, that though the Duke defired to quit that Government, yet that his intention therein, was onely the more to prest the fending him the necessary fuccors from hence. do not now again talk fo much as formerly of Don Ju-an's journey into Italy, which, after all, it's believed, his Highness is not throughly disposed to : and therefore till he is on his way, people will doubt what has been too often faid concerning it. The news we reecive from Sicily does not at all please us, but it was hoped the arrival of Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter in those parts, will help to change the face of things to our advantage.

Vienna, Offob. 22. This week are arrived here two Couriers with Letters from the Imperial Army, their Consents are kept private, farther than that it's faid, that the Troops begin to be very hardly put to it for want of Forage, and that there is a necessity of their sudden removal from the quarters they have about Spire. We are likewise told, That General Montecutuli has by order from hence caken those several Posts about Philipsburgs to give some ease to the Palatinate this Winter, by freeing it from the incursions of the French. We formerly gave you an account of feveral Regiments that were ordered to march towards Egrapwe fince understand that they are countermanded. The Turks, notwithstanding all the affurances of the Balla's to the contrary commit frequent Holfilities on the Frontiers, insomuch that there seems to be a little War between the Turkish and Imperial Garisons.

Ratisbonne, octob. 29. The 23 instant, the States of the Empire affembled here, finally resolved, That his Imperial Majesty shall be prayed in the name of the Empire, effectually to command the Colonels and Directors of the several Circles, to put in execution the resolutions that have been taken against such of the States who delay to furnish their Quota of the Troops of the Empire. From Dresden they write, That the Elector of saxony was somewhat distarissied, upon the advice he received, that the Forces of the Duke of Hanouer approached towards his Territories, as if they intended to take their quarters in them. We are informed of a great Fire that hath larely hapned at Altenberg in Sanony, the whole Town, and the Church that was there, being quite deltroyed.

Mayence, Offab. 31. The Circles of Franconia and Fuabia continue to make difficulty to grant the Imperialists Winter-quarters among them; which if they shall persist to do, the Imperial Troops will be put to it for Winter-quarters: for they cannot remain where they are, the Countrey is so eaten up; and to return so for as the Hereditary Countries, would be of great preju-dice to the Emperors affairs. The 1200 Men that were in Garison here, are marched out with two pieces of

Cannon, to join the Duke of Lorrain.

Philipsbergh, Octob. 31. This afternoon one of our parties who had been fent abroad returns, and brings advice, that General Montecueuls is at present at spire, ill of the Gour, That he very much preses the Magistrates of that City to receive an Imperial Garison, and to renounce the Neutrality they have with us. We are assured that the Troops of the Circles have already palled the Rhine, and that they are approached to Luje and Ruje, wherefore our Governor, the Sieu de Fay, has fent out a strong party to observe their mor

Strasburgh, Nov. 1. General Mortecueuti continues to expect the return of Counce Manifeldt from Victina ; in the mean time we are affured, that he has caused his Bridge at Lanterburg to be made up again, and that part of his Troops have already passed it. His Excellency
