HE Merchants, and others, who have delivered into the Office of the Earl of Halifax, One of His Majefly's Principal Secretaries of State, a Defignation of the Ships which they respectively purpole to fend to the Islands restored to France in the West Indies, to bring away their Effects from thence, to the End that Passports might be obtained from the Court of France for the faid Ships, pursuant to the 8th Article of the late Definitive Treaty, are hereby defired to deliver into his Lordship's faid Office, the Name of the Port in that particular Island to which the faid Ships respectively are first intended to proceed.

The Weather has been fo tem-Naples, March 6. pestuous for several Days past, that a Number of the Vessels laden with Corn, which were expected daily to arrive in this Port, are not as yet come. The Venetian Refident, Signor Zon, had on Wednesday last his Audience of Leave of his Sicilian Majefty, and is to fet out for Venice very foon. Signor Gobbi, who fucceeds him, is arrived; but has not yet presented his Credentials.

The Gloriofo, a Spanish Man of War, came into this Port on Thursday last, after a Passage of 20 Days from Cartagena.

Vienna, March 12. This Day, at Ten o'Clock, his Imperial Majefty fet out for Frankfort, attended by the two eldest Arch-dukes, and a vast Retinue.

Venice, March 16. Yesterday Cavalier Tron fet out for Ostiglia in the Veronese State, as Commissiary of this Republick, to meet there, and fettle with Count Silva, appointed Commiffary on the Part of the Empress Queen, the Differences concerning the Waters of the River Tartaro, for the Service of the Rice Grounds, fome other Affairs regarding the Con-fines, and the Regulation of the Poils.

Last Night the Senate constituted two Members of that Body, Inquifitors upon Corn and Grain, who are invefted with Authority to take an Account of all the Corn and Grain in the Terra Ferma, and to compel the Owners of it to fupply the Inhabitants at moderate Prices.

Bonn, March 25. Yesterday, at Six in the Morning, the Elector fet out for Frankfort. His Electoral Highness lies To night at Limbourg on the Lahne, and will arrive this Evening at Frankfort. The Election of a King of the Romans is fixed to the 27th of this Month; the Entry of the Emperor to the 30th ; and the Coronation to the 3d of April.

We expect the Elector will return hither about the 8th or 9th of next Month, as he proposes fetting out from Frankfort the Day after the Emperor.
