

Plate, and to pay the Duty due for the same, according to the Directions of the said Act, although repeated Applications have been made to them for that Purpose by the Directions of the Commissioners of Excise: These are therefore to give Notice, that if they do not comply with the Directions of the said Act, and pay, forthwith, the Duties due for their Plate at the proper Offices appointed to receive the same, the said Commissioners will think themselves obliged (without further Notice) to order Bills to be filed against them in the Court of Exchequer, to enforce the Payment of the said Duties.

Likewise Notice is hereby given to all Persons who own, use, have, or keep, Silver Plate chargeable with the said Duty, and who have never made any Entry of the same, that they are liable to be prosecuted for their Neglect thereof.
