Florence, April 17. N Wednesday Evening Marshal Botta, accompanied by the other Members of the Regency, came to wish his Royal Highness a good Journey. The Duke, attended by Sir Horace Mann, set out next Morning for Sienna, where he arrived early in the Evening, and was received with the same Military Honours as at Leghorn: The Nobility of both Sexes came out of the Town in their Coaches to meet him; and as foon as he arrived at the Inn where he lodged, (Part of which, by Marshal Botta's Order, was furnished from the Emperor's Wardrobe there) the Governor, and the General who commands there at the Head of his Officers, came to pay their Respects to his Royal Highnels, and attended him to see the principal Curiosities of the Place; after which he passed the Evening at a Lady's House, who, by an Order from Marshal Botta, had prepared a Ball and a Supper for him. The next Morning his Royal Highness set out for Rome, and was faluted by the Cannon as the Day

PUBLIC Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed this last Session of Parliament, entitled, An Act for preventing Frauds and Abuses, in relation to the sending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage;

It is Enacted, That from and after the First Day of May next, so long as the Revenue of the Post Office shall continue to make a Part of the Aggregate Fund, no Letters or Packets shall be exempted from Payment of Postage, except as follows:

All fuch as shall be fent from or to The King's most

Excellent Majesty.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, fent from and to any Places within Great Britain or Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Prorogation, which shall be signed on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Great Britain, and whereof the whole Superscription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All Letters and Packets, not exceding the Weight of Two Ounces, sent from and to any Places within Ireland, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before or after any Summons or Proro-gation, which shall be signed on the Outside by any Member of either House of the Parliament of Ireland. and whereof the whole Superscription shall be of his own Hand Writing, or which shall be directed to a Member of either House, from any Part of Great Britain or Ireland, at any of the Places of his usual Residence, or at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at either House of Parliament.

All such Letters and Packets as shall be sent from and to certain Persons by Virtue of their Offices. under fuch Conditions, Restrictions, and Limitations,

as in the faid Act is particularly expressed.

It is likewise Enacted, That all printed Votes, or Proceedings in Parliament, or printed News Papers, fent without Covers, or in Covers open at the Sides, figned on the Outside thereof, by the Hand of any Member of Parliament, in such Manner as hath been heretofore practifed; or directed to any Member at any Place whereof he shall have given Notice in Writing to the Postmaster-General, or to his Deputy at Edinburgh or Dublin respectively, shall pass free of

And also, That the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Postmaster-General, may continue to Frank such printed Votes, and Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers, in the Manner they have heretofore been accustomed, provided they be sent without Covers, or

in Covers open at the Sides.

It is further Enacted, That any Officer employed under the Postmaster-General, shall have Power to examine and search any Packet sent without a Cover,
