Naples, June 12.

HIS Sicilian Majesty's Indisposition having lasted but two or three Days, his Majesty dined again in publick on Sunday the 3d Instant, when Count Lubienki, Envoy Extraordinary from Poland, had in the Morning his Audience of Leave, and a few Days after set out for Venice, where he is to execute the same Commission, with which he had been charged at this Court, and That of Rome.

On Saturday last the Orders were given for the Court's Return from Caserta on the 16th Instant; but instead of coming to Naples, his Sicilian Majesty goes directly to Portici.

On the 31st of last Month his Sicilian Majesty performed the Ceremony of Investing the Marquis Tanucci with the Ensigns of the Royal Order of St. Januarius; which Honour had lately been conferred upon his Excellency by the Catholick King.

Florence, June 19. His Royal Highness the Duke of York is expected here To-morrow.

Stockholm, June 22. The Prince Royal was at the Camp last Tuesday to see the Regiment of Guards exercise, and commanded one of the Battalions himself. On Wednesday the King and the Prince were in Town to review the Burghers, both Cavalry and Infantry, who performed their Exercise surprisngly well, and to the Satisfaction of all who were present. Next Week his Majesty will come to the Park, to make the General Review of the Guards; after which, it is supposed, the Camp will soon break up.
