A PROCLAMATION.

HEREAS We have received His Majefty's Commands to give the ne-

ceffary Orders for carrying into Execu-tion in the Kingdon of Ireland, His Majefly's Commands, fignified by an Order, made by His Majefty in Council, bearing Date the 17th Day of August Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and fixty-four, which is in the Words following, viz.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 17th Day of August, 1764,

"PRESENT, The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. H E R E A S the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have represented to " His Majesty at this Board, That the Endeavours " they have used for improving His Majesty's Re-" venues of Customs, and for preventing the many " Frauds committed, especially in the Out-Ports of " this Kingdom, are greatly obstructed by the pre-fent State of the Isle of Man, from whence a per-" nicious and illicit Trade is carried on to the " neighbouring Coafts of Great Britain and Ireland, in Violation of the Laws of this Country, and to the great Detriment and Diminution of the Public \* Revenue; That this Evil, which has long been \* complained of, is of late Years very much increaled, notwithstanding the Acts made in the 7th
and 12th Years of the Reign of King George the
First, for putting a Stop to fuch illegal and defructive Practices—His Majesty having taken the fame into Confideration, is hereby pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly to 66 41 Order, Require and Command all His Officers and "Minifters, and all others his loving Subjects, "whom it may concern, that they be watchful and diligent in feeing the feveral Laws and Sta-tutes for putting a Stop to fuch illegal and de-fructive Practices, duly observed and put in Exe-" cution :- And His Majefty doth hereby declare and advertize all Perfons whatfoever, who fhall be
 found offending or carrying on any illicit Trade
 and Practices, contrary to the feveral Laws and \*\* Statutes, aforementioned, that his Majefty will caufe " them to be proceeded against with the utmost Ri-" gour of the Law — And the Lords Commiffioners of His Majelty's Treafury are to give firict Orders to all Officers under their Department, that they " use their ut oft Endeavours to carry His Majesty's " Commands, with respect to the Laws and Statutes " aforementioned, into Execution; And the Lords " Commissioners of the Admiralty are to station a " fufficient Number of Ships and Cutters, under the " Command of difcreet Officers, in the Harbours " and on the Coafts of the Isle of Man, and to " give strict Orders to the faid Officers, as well as " to all others within their Department, that they 66 use their utmost Endeavours to carry His Ma-

" jefty's Commands hereby fignified into Execu-tion-And the Lord Lieutenant of his Majefty's " Kingdom of Ireland, or in his Absence the Lordo "Juffices of that Kingdom, are to give fuch Di-"rections for carrying His Majefty's Commands "hereby fignified into Execution, as to them may " refpectively appertain."

Now We the Lords Juffices General and General Governors of Ireland, in Obedience to His Majesty's Commands, do firifily Charge and Command all His Majesty's Officers and Ministers, and all others His Majelty's loving Subjects, whom it may concern, that they be watchful and diligent in feeing the feveral Laws and Statutes, made for putting a Stop to the illegal and defiructive Practices abovementioned, duly obferved and put in Execution. And We do hereby declare and advertife all Perfons whatfoever, who shall be found offending or carrying on any il-licit Trade and Practices, contrary to the feveral Laws and Statutes aforementioned, that We have received His Majesty's Commands to cause them to be proceeded against with the utmost Rigour of the Law.

St. James's, September 22. This Day being the Anniversary of Their Majeffies Coronation, there was a grand Appearance of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, and other Per-fons of Diffinction, to compliment their Majeffies on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Petersburgh, August 21. The Empress is perfectly recovered of her late Indisposition.

Warfaw, August 30. Monday last, being the Day fixed for the Diet of Election, the Primate, with the Senators and Nonces, went in a magnificent Proceffion to the Field, half a Mile diftant from this Town, allotted for this important Ceremony : The first Object was the Choice of a Marshal, by the Chamber of Nonces, which fell on the Great Notary of Lithuania Count Solnoffiky. Yesterday they fent a Deputation to the Senate to acquaint them of this

Choice; and this Day the two Chambers will join. Copenhagen, September 4. The Nuptials of their Reyal and most Serene Highnesse, the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Hesse, were solemnised on Sa-turday last in the Presence of their Danish Majesties and the Royal Family ; all the Foreign Ministers by Invitation affilted, and afterwards fupped, in the oftal Manner, at the King's Table. The City was fuperbly illuminated, and all Ranks of People shewed the utmost joy on this happy Occasion. Yesterday-the whole Court waited on their Royal and most Serane Highnesses with Compliments of Felicitation;

and the Evening concluded with a Supper and Ball at the Prince Royal's Apartments. This Day, being her Danish Majesty's Birth-Day, there will be a Ball and Supper at Court ; and To morrow the Royal Family will return to Fridenfburgh; from whence, it is faid, the Prince and Prince's will speedily fet out for Hanau.

The King of Denmark on this Occasion gave nine Ribbons of the Order of Dannebrog, and made fome other Promotions of lefs Moment.

Turin, September 8. There is Advice from Genoa that two Genoefe Ships, endeavouring to throw tome Succours into St. Firenzo, then clutely belieged by the Malecontents of Corfica, were opposed in their Defign by four Ships belonging to the Corficans ; and that, after a very that p Engigement, the two Genoese Ships had taken one of the Corficans, funk another, and obliged the two others to run away; after which they brought their Succours into the Port of St. Firenzo.

About a Formight ago three Maltefe Galliots ( f those which are the Property of the Great Master of the O der of Malta) attacked, on the Coalt of Sar dinia, four Algerine Xebeques, took three of them, and gave the other Chace, though in vain Thefe Galliots were come, at the Requist of the Vice Rou of Sardinia, to cruize on the Coafts of the Island, which are infefted with Algerines; and his Sardinian Majesty has just now ordered his two Frigat s to fail but immediately to join the Maltele Ships on the fame Cruize.

St. James's, September 21, 1764. Whereas it has been humbly reprefented to the King, That, on Saturday the 25th of August last. between the Hours of One and Two in the Morning, a Fire broke out in the Workshop of Aynfavorth Thawaites, of Rosa man's-Row in the Parish of St James.
