A PROCLAMATION.

Shannon. Jn. Ponsonby.

WHEREAS We have received His Majesty's Commands to give the necessary Orders for carrying into Execution in the Kingdom of Ireland, His Majesty's Commands, signified by an Order, made by His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the 17th Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-four, which is in the Words following, viz.

" AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 17th Day of
August, 1764,

" P R E S E N T,

" The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

" **W**HEREAS the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have represented to His Majesty at this Board, That the Endeavours they have used for improving His Majesty's Revenues of Customs, and for preventing the many Frauds committed, especially in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, are greatly obstructed by the present State of the Isle of Man, from whence a pernicious and illicit Trade is carried on to the neighbouring Coasts of Great Britain and Ireland, in Violation of the Laws of this Country, and to the great Detriment and Diminution of the Public Revenue; That this Evil, which has long been complained of, is of late Years very much increased, notwithstanding the Acts made in the 7th and 12th Years of the Reign of King George the First, for putting a Stop to such illegal and destructive Practices.—His Majesty having taken the same into Consideration, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, strictly to Order, Require and Command all His Officers and Ministers, and all others his loving Subjects, whom it may concern, that they be watchful and diligent in seeing the several Laws and Statutes for putting a Stop to such illegal and destructive Practices, duly observed and put in Execution:—And His Majesty doth hereby declare and advertize all Persons whatsoever, who shall be found offending or carrying on any illicit Trade and Practices, contrary to the several Laws and Statutes, aforementioned, that his Majesty will cause them to be proceeded against with the utmost Rigour of the Law.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give strict Orders to all Officers under their Department, that they use their utmost Endeavours to carry His Majesty's Commands, with respect to the Laws and Statutes aforementioned, into Execution; And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to station a sufficient Number of Ships and Cutters, under the Command of discreet Officers, in the Harbours and on the Coasts of the Isle of Man, and to give strict Orders to the said Officers, as well as to all others within their Department, that they use their utmost Endeavours to carry His Ma-

“ jesty's Commands hereby signified into Execution—And the Lord Lieutenant of his Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, or in his Absence the Lords Justices of that Kingdom, are to give such Directions for carrying His Majesty's Commands hereby signified into Execution, as to them may respectively appertain.”

Now We the Lords Justices General and General Governors of Ireland, in Obedience to His Majesty's Commands, do strictly Charge and Command all His Majesty's Officers and Ministers, and all others His Majesty's loving Subjects, whom it may concern, that they be watchful and diligent in seeing the several Laws and Statutes, made for putting a Stop to the illegal and destructive Practices abovementioned, duly observed and put in Execution. And We do hereby declare and advertize all Persons whatsoever, who shall be found offending or carrying on any illicit Trade and Practices, contrary to the several Laws and Statutes aforementioned, that We have received His Majesty's Commands to cause them to be proceeded against with the utmost Rigour of the Law.

GOD Save the KING.

St. James's, September 22.

This Day being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, there was a grand Appearance of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Petersburgh, August 21. The Empress is perfectly recovered of her late Indisposition.

Warsaw, August 30. Monday last, being the Day fixed for the Diet of Election, the Primate, with the Senators and Nonces, went in a magnificent Procession to the Field, half a Mile distant from this Town, allotted for this important Ceremony: The first Object was the Choice of a Marshal, by the Chamber of Nonces, which fell on the Great Notary of Lithuania Count Sosnoffky. Yesterday they sent a Deputation to the Senate to acquaint them of this Choice; and this Day the two Chambers will join.

Copenhagen, September 4. The Nuptials of their Royal and most Serene Highnesses, the Hereditary Prince and Princess of Hesse, were solemnized on Saturday last in the Presence of their Danish Majesties and the Royal Family; all the Foreign Ministers by Invitation assisted, and afterwards supped, in the usual Manner, at the King's Table. The City was superbly illuminated, and all Ranks of People shewed the utmost Joy on this happy Occasion. Yesterday the whole Court waited on their Royal and most Serene Highnesses with Compliments of Felicitacion; and

and the Evening concluded with a Supper and Ball at the Prince Royal's Apartments. This Day, being her Danish Majesty's Birth-Day, there will be a Ball and Supper at Court; and To-morrow the Royal Family will return to Fridenburgh; from whence, it is said, the Prince and Princess will speedily set out for Hanau.

The King of Denmark on this Occasion gave nine Ribbons of the Order of Dannebrog, and made some other Promotions of less Moment.

Turin, September 8. There is Advice from Genoa that two Genoese Ships, endeavouring to throw some Succours into St. Firenzo, then closely besieged by the Malecontents of Corsica, were opposed in their Design by four Ships belonging to the Corsicans; and that, after a very sharp Engagement, the two Genoese Ships had taken one of the Corsicans, sunk another, and obliged the two others to run away; after which they brought their Succours into the Port of St. Firenzo.

About a Fortnight ago three Maltese Gallies (of those which are the Property of the Great Master of the Order of Malta) attacked, on the Coast of Sardinia, four Algerine Xebques, took three of them, and gave the other Chance, though in vain. These Gallies were come, at the Request of the Vice Roy of Sardinia, to cruize on the Coasts of the Island, which are infested with Algerines; and his Sardinian Majesty has just now ordered his two Frigates to sail but immediately to join the Maltese Ships on the same Cruize.

St. James's, September 21, 1764.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Saturday the 25th of August last, between the Hours of One and Two in the Morning, a Fire broke out in the Workshop of Aynsworth Thwaites, of Rosaman's-Row in the Parish of St. James, Clerkenwell, which totally consumed the same, with sundry curious Pieces of Church, and other, Clock-Work, finished, or nearly so; and, also with great Variety of Working-Tools, Engines and other expensive Utensils in Trade; and that there is Reason to apprehend the said Workshop was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Persons unknown: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in that wicked Crime, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them (except the Person principally concerned therein) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
