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From Tuesday October 23, to Saturday October 27, 1764.

St. James's, October 25. HIS Day being the Anniverfary of the King's Accession to the Throne, there was a numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majefty on that Occafion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonftrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

A'T the Court at St. James's the 12th Day of October, 1764,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the Third Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, "An Act for the further Improve-"ment of His Majesty's Revenue of Customs, and " for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures, ** and for the Prevention of the Clandefine Run-** ning of Goods into any Part of His Majefty's Do-** minions," it is (amongst other Things) Enacted, That one Moiety of the nett Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Veffels and Prohibited Goods, which should be feized after the First Day of May, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Three, and condemned and fold according to Law, (the Charges thereof being first deducted) should be allowed by the Commissioners of the Customs to any Officers of the Cuftoms who should feize the fame; and that the other Moiety thereof should be paid by the faid Commiffioners into the Receipt of His Majefty's Exchequer, in lieu of His Majefty's Share thereof, (except in those Cafes which are otherwise provided for by the faid Act :) And that for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the better Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all fuch Ships and Veffels of War belonging to His Majefty, His Heirs and Succeffors, who may be employed in preventing the clandeftine Running of Goods on the Coafts of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colo-nies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, to direct and appoint the Moiety therein before-mentioned, or any other Part of all and every the Seizure and Seizures that thall be made by fuch Officers and Seamen respectively, fo employed as aforefaid, to be divided amongst all fuch Offi-cers and Seamen who shall make any fuch Seizure, in fuch Proportions, and in fuch Manner, as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct, by any Order or Orders of Council,

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or islued from Time to Time for that Purpofer: And whereas by one other Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, entituled, "An Act for granting certain Duties in the British Colonies and Plantations in America, for continuing, amending and making perpetual an Act paffed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majefty King George the Second, (intituled, An A& for the better fecuring and encouraging the Trade of His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America) for applying the Produce " of fuch Duties, and of the Duties to arife by Virtue of the faid Act, towards defraying the Expences of defending, protecting, and fecuring, the faid Colonies and Plantations; for explaining an Act made in the Twenty Fifth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, (intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of the Greenland and Eastland ٠**د** "Trades, and for the better fecuring the Plantation "Trade,) and for altering and difallowing feveral "Drawbacks on Exports from this Kingdom, and more effectually preventing the clandeftine Con-veyance of Goods to and from the faid Colonies and Plantations, and improving and fecuring the " Trade between the fame and Great Britain"; it is, amongst other Things enacted, That all Penalties and Forfeitures inflicted by that, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the Trade and Revenues of the British Colonies or Plantations in Ame-rica, which shall be incurred and recovered there, (except fuch Seizures as shall be made at Sea by the Commanders or Officers of His Majefty's Ships or Vessels of War duly authorized to make Seizures) shall be divided, after deducting the Charges of Profecution from the Grofs Produce thereof, into three Parts; and that one Part of the nett Produce thereof should be paid into the Hands of the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port or Place where. fuch Penalties or Forfeitures should be recovered for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors; one other Third to the Governor of the Colony, and the other Third to the Seizer or Profecutor ; and that one Moiety of all fuch Seizures as should be made at Sea by His Majefty's Ships and Veffels as aforefaid, and of the Penalties and Forfeitures recovered thereon, first deducting the Charges as aforefaid, shall be paid as aforefaid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cultoms, to and for the Ule of His Ma-jefty. His Heirs and Succeffors; and the other Moiety to him or them who shall Seize, Inform, and Sue for the fame; fubject neverthelefs to fuch Diftribution of the Produce of the Seizures fo made at Sea, as well with Regard to the Moiety therein before granted to His Majefly, His Heirs, and Succeffors, as with Regard to the other Moiety given to the Seizer or Profecutor, as His Majefly, His Heirs and Succeffors shall think fit to order and direct by any Order or Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be made for that Purpose; His Majesty taking the fame into his Royal Consideraor by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be made | tion, is hereby pleafed, purfuant to the Powers vefted in
