THIS Day the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Sewell, Knight, Master of the Rolls, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Percy Earl of Thomond to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Somerset, his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

WH E R E A S His Majesty was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 12th Day of October last, to order, permit, and authorize the Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, into that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called England (pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty for that Purpose, during the present Recess, by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament) until and provided the same be landed in any of the Ports of that Part of the said Kingdom of Great Britain called England, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant December. — And whereas the Time thereby limited for the Importation of the said Salted Provisions is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient that the same should be continued for as long Time as His Majesty by the said Act is empowered to permit the same—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly Ordered, that the Time limited by the said Proclamation, for the Importation of Salted Beef, Salted Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, be prolonged and extended to the Ninth Day of January next inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice.

Genoa, November 24. Advice has been received from Bastia, that the Malecontents have laid Siege to Macinaggio, and continued that against St. Fiorenza.

Lisbon, November 25. The Expedition and Hannover Packets arrived here on Tuesday the 20th; the former with two Mails, the latter with one. M. Ayres de Sá e Mello, his most Faithful Majesty's Ambassador to the Catholick King, with M. Joseph de Sá Perreira, Minister Plenipotentiary to the King of the Two Sicilies, set out on Wednesday the 14th Instant for Madrid.

Madrid, November 26. His Catholick Majesty will be here on the 1st of December: The new Palace is ready for the Reception of his Majesty and all the Royal Family.

His Excellency the Earl of Rochford intends to be here To-morrow.

Berlin, December 1. Last Thursday Sir George Macartney, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Russia, set out from hence for Dantzig on his Way to Petersburg.
