A Proclamation for prohibiting the Importation of Commodities of Europe into any of His Majefties Plantations in Africa, Afia, or America, which were not Laden in England; and for putting all other Laws relating to the Trade of the Plantations, in effectual execution.

CHARLES R.

Hereas by one ASt of Parliament made in the Fifteenth Tear of His Majefties Reign, Entituled, (An Act for the Encouragement of Trade) it is Enatted, That from and after the Tmenty fifth day of March, 1664. No Commodities of the growth, production or manifasture of Europe, shall be Impor. red into any Land, Island, Plantation, Colony, Terri-tory or Place to His Migesty belonging or which shall belong unto, or be in the possession of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Afia, Africa, or America, (Tanger only excepted) but what shall be bona fide, and without fraux Laden and Shipped in England, Wales, or the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, and which shall be carried directly thence to the faid Lands, Islands, Plantations, Colonies, 7 e ritories and Places, and from no other place what foever, any Liw, Statute, or Usage to the contrary notwithstanding, und r the Penalty of the Lojs of all fuch Commodities of the growth, production or manufacture of Europe, as shall be Imported into any of them, from any other place what joever, by Land, or by Water; and if by Water, of

the Ship or Veffel allo in which they were Imported, with all her Guns, Tackle, Furniture, Ammunition and Apparel, the faid Forfeitures to be disposed as by the faid AS & directed: Browided, that it shall be lawful to Ship and Lade in fuch Ships; and jo Navi-gated; as in the faid Act is expressed, in any part of Europe, Salt for the Fisheries of New-England and New found-land; and to Ship and Lade in the Maderas, Wines of the growth thereof; and Ship and Lade n the Weflein Islands, or Azores, Wines of the growth If the faid Islands; and to ship and Take in Servants or Horfes in Scotland or Iteland ; and to Ship or Lade in Sectland, all forts of Victual of the growth or production of Scotland; and to Ship or Lade in Ireland, all forts of Victual of the growth or production of Ireland, and the fame to transport into any of the faid Lands, Islands, Plantations, Colonies, Territories or Places, Any thing in the foregoing Claufe to the contrary notwithstanding. And whereas His Majesty is well informed, That notwithflanding the faid wift of Parliament, great quantities of other Commodities of the growth, production and minufacture of Europe, (then what are by the fail Alt permitted) have been, and are daily Imported into [everal of Hin Cotonies, Plantations and Territories, in Alia. Africa and America, (befiles Tanger ; ) and that His Majeflies subjects of some of His Colonies and Plantations, have not only supplied themsclues with fuch commo-

dities not Shipped in England, Wales or Berwick, but

have conveyed them by Land and Water, to other of

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His Majefiles Colonies and Plantations, to the great prejudice of His Majesties Customs, and of the Trade and Mavigation of this Kingdom: His Majesty there-fore for the prevention thereof for the future, doth by this His Royal Proclamition, (with the advice of His Privy Council) Require and Command all and evers His Subjects, that they do not for the future pre-fumerio Import any Commodities of the growth, produstion or minufasture of Europe, ( except what may be imported by vertue of the Proviso aforefaid) by Landfor Water, into any Land, Ifland, Plantation, Colong, ferritory or Place, to His Majefty belonging, or which hereafter shall belong unto, or be in the possession of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, (fanger onely excepted) but which shall be bona fide, and without fraud Laden and Shipped in England, Wales, or the Town of Berwick, and carried directly from the according to the true meaning of the faid Alt; whereaf all perfons concerned are to take notice, and yield due obedience thereunto. And His Majefly. doth further Strictly direct and require all Governors of His Colonies and Plantations, and of all Lands, Mands and Places in His pofferfion in Alias Africa, and America, ( Tanger orely excepted ) to take care that this His Royal Proc'amation be put in due Execution : And a'fo that one Aft made in the Twelfill Year of His Majefties Reign, Entituded, (An Ace for the Encouraging and Increase of Shipping and Navigation ) and one All mide in the Two and twenticth and Three and twentieth Years of His Reign, Enrituled, (An AA for the Regulating ibe Plantation Trade) and also one other Act made in the Five and twents eth Tear of His Majeftios Reign, Entituled, (An AA for the better Securing the Plantation Trade ) together with all other the Laws of this His Kingdom of Eng-land, relating to the Trade of His Plantations. be duly objerved and put in execution in their respective Governments : And His Majefty doth further require all His fild Governors, and that they Command all Officers, Civil and Militury, under their respective Commands, to be aiding and affifting therein, and to the Collectors and other Officers of His Majefites Cuftems under them, in the execution of their respective Offices in order thereunto, as they and every of them will answer the contrary at their utmost Perils.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the 24th day of Novemb r, in the 27th year of Our Reign,

Naples, Nov. 12. Two dayes fince arrived here two Veffels laden with Corn from Apuglia, one of which met the 9th inftant off of Cape Spartavento with the Prince of Mantefarchio, who had only then with him eight Men of War, the reft being separated from him in-bad weather, as the Prince himself told this Master; who adds, that paffing through the Fare of Meffina in the night, he faw a great thip on fire, which having burne fome time, was blown up by her own Powder; and therefore it is believed to have been a Man of War, but whether French or Spanish knows not.

Florence, Nov. 19. Our last Letters from Sigily ad. vile. vife, That the Spanifb Armada who had Cruffed fome time off of Meffina, had lately been attacked. with a most violent ftorm, which had feparated it; and it's added that four or five Men of War are miffing, and, as it's feared, are lost together with two Fireships. We hear not as yet of the arrival of Lieutenant. Admiral de Ruyter in those parts.

Stockholme, Nov. 3. We are told that the King has fent express orders to the Ryck Admiral to go to Sea again with the Fleet, his Majefly being much diffatisfied with its fo fudden return into Port, and having appointed Commissioners to examine the Reasons that induced it. The King is gone to his Troops, with intention to march with them towards Gottenburgh, not far from whence we are told that the Heer Guldenlieu, Vicerby of Norway, is entred with 7000 Men into the Suediff Territories; though this day we have news that he is retired again towards Normay.

Elfenore, Nov. 16. The Dutch Men of War that have been abroad with the Danish Fleet, are now in this Road, and preparing for their return to Holland. Three Men of War that were fitted in Holland at the charge of the Elector of Brandenburgh, and have been employed in the Wefer against Carelfadt as well as in the Elberare arrived here.

Danierick, Nov. 23. The 17 inftant we had here a most violent florm, the Wind at E. N. E. and N. E. in which feven Holland Ships, five Galiots and a Hamburgher, all Laden, were caft away in our Road. And the 21 instant, we had an account of 11 Dutch Mer-chantmen moretogether with a Man of War of 11 Guns that Convoyed them, which were stranded about 7 or 8 Leagues from this place. From Poland we have advice, that the Turks and Tartars being gone into their Winter-quarters, the King was returning to Leopol : and that ar the earnest instance of the Senators, his Majelty had appointed a Dyet to be held in Fanuary, in order to his Coronation, and the taking such refolutions there, as to enable him to carry on the War vigoroully next Spring.

Hamburgh, Nov. 22. We have hitle to advise from hence, Wilmar defending it felf bravely, and giving the Daner much more work than they expected. The Elector of Brandenburgh is fuddenly expected at Berlin, if not already arrived there. . On Saturday laft the Duke of Zell with his brother the Duke of Wolfembuttel, came hither incognito. We have of late had very bad weather, and we hear of feveral thips that have been loft in the Baltique.

Dite, Decemb. 6. Here hath been this day a hot report, that the Danes have made an Affault, upon Wifmar, and that they have lost a great many Men, but what the final successivas we are yet to learn.' From Berlis of the first infant they write, that leveral Brankenburgh Regiments, who were already in their Winter-quarters, had received orders to march for the ith to-wards Wifmay, to affilt at that Siege. We have had very bad

wards wifnar, to addit at that Stege. We have had very bad weather within thele few dayes, which has occafioned great damage to this place by the high waters. Braffels, Nov. 29. His Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa has given out Commissions for the making up three Wallon Regiments, of the independent Companies which lay at Leeuwe and other places, with the addition of form new Companies which gas to be fourthwich wild a three Companies Mon which are to be forthwith raifed ; the three Colonels are Mon-Which are to be forthwith ranked ; the three Colonets are Mon-fieur de Bersé a Brogundian, Monfieur de Monde, and Monfieur Hemanda. The fudden change of the Weather has put aftop to the defigns of the French, if they had any upon Flanders and the Countrey of Wass; however his Excellency continues to provide for the fourity of that Province, and Troops march daily that way to hinder the Enemies paffage. Yeiterday the Marguis d'Offera parted from hence to  $F_{i,RR}$ -ders, where he is to command. Yefterday arrived the Ordiarry from Spain, by which we have an account of Don Juan of Aufria's being retired to Sarogoffa, having wholly excuted his Journey to Italy. We expect daily a confiderable Sum of Mo-ney from Spain, without which his Excellency will not be able. to execute his delign of recruiting all the Wakon and German Regiments to 700 Men each, and the Troops of Horle to 50 in The Dragoons are likewife to be recruited to 50 Comeach panies, and we are promifed a Regiment of 1000 Foot from

panies, and we are promifed a Regiment of 1600 Poot from Spim, to that we hope to have a good Army againft next Cam-pague, tipecially if Money fail not. Ditto, Decemb 10. His Excellency our Governor General, has diffatched the neceffary Palsports tor the French Plenipo-tentiaries, who are thought to be on their way to Nimeguea. The generality of people are extremely enclined to Peace. Hage, Docemb 6. Since the pronouncing the Sentence for perpetual Impriforment againft Monficur Wiequefort, the Court of Juffice hath Cited the Heer Grovius (who is in Town ill of the Gout ) to appear before them, to answer fuch mat-ters as are charged againft him. The States of Holdand having refolved that the fact of the War for the enfuing year thall be the fame it was the laft, are feparated, and gone home to coa-fult with their Principals about the raifing of the Monies ne-ceffary for the fame. From Bromen we have advice, That Ca-relfadis is clofe blocked up by the Luwenburg and Daniff Troops, reffadis clofe blocked up by the Linenburg and Danifs Troops, and fo ftraightned by them, that it is thought it will be at laft forced to furrender. Jamaica, Sept. 20. The 8th inftant arrived here the Commif-fioners (wiz. Mr. Cranfeild, Mr. Dickenson, and Mr Brent) and Ships, which His Majeffy was pleafed to fend to Surinan,. to fetch off fuch English with their Servants and Goods, as fhould be willing to leave that Colony (purfuant to the Arti-cles of the late Treaty between His Majefty and the States General) from whence they have brought feveral confiderable General) from whence they have broughtieveral confiderable Englifh Planters, together with their Chriftian and Negro Ser-vants, making in all about 1200 performs; whom our Gover-nor, the Loid Vaughan, upon their arrival here, according to His Majefties order, received very kindly, alotting them double the quantity of Land which has been ufually granted to others, and taking all other care of their conveniency and fublifience. And as this Ifland will receive a great advantage from this In-And as this hiand will receive a great advantage from this in-crease of Inhabitants ( who bringing with them all Materials and Neceffaries for Planting, will have in a flort time very confiderable Plantations) fo are they extremely feusible of His Majefties great goodness to, and gracious regard of them, in causing them to be removed hither, such good provision to be made for them during their Voyage, and fuch care to be taken of them upon their Arrival here of them upon their Arrival here

Deale, Decemb. 2. By a Veffel arrived in the Downes from the Earbades, we have Advice of a very violent Hurrftane which hapned there on the laft of Angust, and did great harm as well on Shore as at Sea, eight Merchants Ships and five Ketches which were in the Road, having been caft away, and most of the Men drowned; and on Shore, about 300 Houles thrown to the ground; and many People, Whites and Negroes to the number of 200 killed, befides other fad effects of this Calamity.
