

move the Imperialists from *Lauterburgh*, and reestablish the free passage of the *Rhine* between this City and *Philipsburgh*, which is at present wholly interrupted by the Garrison at *Lauterburgh*. The French we hear are likewise preparing to put a great Convoy into *Philipsburgh*, and at the same time, General *Schultz* assembles a Body of Men together on the other side of the *Rhine*, near *Stolhoffen*, to hinder it. The Troops of the Circles having quitted the Posts they held about *Philipsburgh*, upon the orders they received from the Directors of the said Circles, without the participation of the Marquis de *Baden Dourlach*, General of the Empire, he is thereupon gone in great haste to *Vienne*, to complain thereof to the Emperor, with intention in his passage to make some complaint to the Dyet at *Ratisbonne*.

Rostock, Nov. 27. The Elector of *Brandenburg* having polled several Troops about *Anclam* so as to hold it blocked up this Winter, and put the rest into Winter-quarters, is returned to *Berlin*. From *Straelßond* we hear, that 2000 Suedish Foot, and 500 Horſes, were marched from thence under the command of Count *Cöningsmark*, upon some great design. And while we are not without suspicion that they may have an eye upon this place, we are putting our selves into a posture to receive them, in case it should prove so. *Wismar* makes a brave defence, and the King of *Denmark* still defers the general Assault, to spare the Inhabitants, and the lives of so many Men must be lost in it.

Berlin, Nov. 27. The 29 instant the Elector of *Brandenburg* is expected to arrive here, together with her Electoral Highness, and their whole Court. The Velt-Marschal *Dorffing* in the mean time remains with his Troops before *Anclam*, and the Prince of *Anhalt* is before *Lochenitz*, and we seem here to promise our selves that a short time will bring us an account of both these places being surrendered, though there is in each of them a very good Garrison.

Lubeck, Nov. 28. The last advices we have from the Danish Camp before *Wismar*, are dated the 25 instant, and give an account of a sally the besieged made on the 21, with 500 Foot, among whom were several Burgers; and a party of Horſes, they thought to have surprized the Besiegers, having to that end made an Alarm on the other side of the Town; to draw the Enemies attention that way, but it seems the Danes were in a better posture to receive them than the Suedes had expected, who were forced to return home again, leaving four or five prisoners behind them, of whom two or three were Burgers; his Majesty commanded that they should be forthwith set at liberty, and to return into the Town, to give their fellow Citizens warning not to mingle themselves any more with the Suedes in their sallies, for that in case they should be taken, they must expect to be immediately hung up. It is said that hitherto the Besiegers to spare the Town, have not made use of their Granadoes nor Fireballs, of which they have a great quantity in the Camp, but intend to bestow them upon the Town, if it do not surrender very suddenly. Here is a report, brought by a certain Vessel arrived from the Coast of *Sueden*, that notwithstanding the advanced season, the Suedish Fleet is coming to Sea again.

Hamburg, Decem. 2. The Elector of *Brandenburg* having given the necessary orders for the putting his Forces into Winter-quarters, is returned himself with his Court to *Berlin*. The Besieged in *Wismar* continue to defend themselves very bravely, which will oblige the Danes to make the so long intended attacks, to make use of the Granadoes and Fireworks, which they

have prepared in great abundance, which they doubt not but to do great execution when they come to employ them. The Lettes from *Sueden* seem to say that the Rycks Admiral was confined to his Houle till farther order from the King.

Hague, Decemb. 10. The States, upon advice that the Plenipotentiaries of His Majesty of Great Britain, as likewise those of the Molt Christian King, were ready to begin their journey to *Nimeguen*, the place appointed for the Treating a general Peace, have likewise commanded their Ambassadors to be ready to depart forthwith; so that if the Plenipotentiaries of the other Parties are as forward as those above-mentioned, it is thought the Congress may be yet begun before the end of this month. The Letters by the last Ordinary from *Hamburg*, tell us of some Action that hath lately passed at the Siege of *Wismar*, the Danes having made an Attack upon the place, but they disagree in the account they give of the success: for some say, that the Danes were repulsed with the loss of a great many Men on their side; others, that after a sharp dispute they gained certain Outworks, so that we must expect till the arrival of our next Letters from those parts, to have a certain and particular information. The Sieur *Bimbes*, who commands the Dutch Squadron of Men of War that was with the Danish Fleet in the Baltique this Summer, hath upon his representation, that it would be very inconvenient to remain with the said Men of War in those parts this Winter, obtained Orders to return home with his Squadron, and such Merchantmen as shall be ready to come with him.

Paris, Decemb. 14. There is but little news at present to write from hence, for you have already been told of the great preparations that are making in this Kingdom against the next Campaign, though in the mean time there seems not wanting a good disposition to Peace: and in order thereunto, we expect every day to hear that our Plenipotentiaries are on their journey to *Nimeguen*, where they will doubtless arrive with the first. We had a report some days in Town, that the Prince of *Conde* had received Orders to return forthwith to the *Rhine*, in order to some great Action, but it seems to be merely a report. Here are lately arrived two Extraordinary Couriers from *Bourdeaux*, and though we know not the subject of their Errand, yet it is generally believed, that the Marschal d' *Albret* the Governor, has written to the King to intercede in the behalf of that City, which now bears the punishment of the disorders and mutinies it was guilty of this last Summer. The Marschal de *Cregis* who arrived here some time since, is only at liberty upon Parole for a month, in which time if he does not raise his Ransom, which is said to be only Fifty thousand Livres, he is to return to *Cabris*, and to surrender himself a Prisoner again.
