move the Imperialifis from Lautorbargh, and reftablish the free passage of the Rhine between this City and Philipsburgh, which is at prefent wholly interrupted by the Garifon at Lauterburg. The French we hear are likewife preparing to put a great Convoy into Philipsburgh, and at the fame time, General Schult? affembles a Body of Men together on the other fide of the Rhine, near Stolhoffen, to hinder it. The Troops of the Circles having quitted the Pofts they held about Philipsburgh, upon the orders they received from the Directors of the fild Circles, without the participasion of the Marquis de' Baden Dourlach, General of the Empire, he is thereupon gone in great hafte to Vienna, to complain thereof to the Emperor, with intention in his paffage to make fome complaint to the Dyet at Ratisbonne.

Rofteck, Nov. 27. The Elector of Brandonburg ha-ving polled feveral Troops about Anciam fo as to hold it blocked up this Winter, and put the reft into Winterquarters, is returned to Berlin. From Straelfond we hear, that 2000 Suedish Foot, and 500 Horse, were marched from thence under the command of Count Co-ningsmark, npon some great design. And while we are not without fuspition that they may have an eye upon this place, we are putting our felves into a posture to teceive them, in case it should prove so. Wilmar makes a brave defence, and the King of Denmark still defers the general Aflauls, to spare the Inhabitants, and the lives of formany Men must be lost in it.

Berlin, Nov. 27. The 29 inftant the Elector of Brandenburgh is expected to artive here, togother with her Electoral Highneis, and their whole Court. The Velt-Mareschal Dorfling in the mean time remains with his Troops before Anclam, and the Prince of Anhalt is before Lochenitz, and we feem here to promife our felves that a fhort time will bring us an account of both these places being furrendred, though there is in each of them a very good Garison.

Lubeck, Nev. 28. The laft advices we have from the Danith Camp before Wifmar, are dated the roinftant; and give an account of a fally the belieged made on the 21, with 500 Foot, among whom were feveral Burg-hers, and a party of Horfe, they thought to have furprized the Befiegers, having to that end made an Alarum on the other fide of the Town, to draw the Enemies attention that way, but it feems the Danes were in a betier pofture to receive them than the Suedes had'expected, who were forced to return home again, leaving four or five prifoners behind them, of whom two or three were Burghers; his Majefty commanded that they flould be forthwith fet at liberty, and to return into the Town, to give their fellow Citizens warning not to mingle themselves any more with the Suedes in their fallies, for that in cafe they fhould be taken, they must expect to be immediately hung up. It is faid that hitherto the Befiegefs to fpare the Town, have not made ufe of their Granadoes nor Fireballs, of which they have a great quantity in the Camp, but intend to beftow them upon the Town, if it do not furrender very fuddenly. Here is freport, brought by a certain Veffel arrived from the Coalt of Sueden, that notwithstanding the advanced feason, the Suedish Fleet is coming to Sea again.

Hamburg, Decem, 2. The Elector of Brandenburg having given the neceffary orders for the putting his Forces into Winter-quarters, is returned himfelt with his Court to Berlin. The Befieged in Wifmar continue to defend themfelves very bravely, which will oblige the Danes to make the fo long intended attacks, to make use of the Granadoes and Fireworks, which they

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have prepared in great abundance, which they doubt not but to do great execution when they come to employ them. The Lettes from Suedon feem tofay that the Rycks Admiral was confined to his Houle till farther order from the King.

Hague, Decemb. 10. The States, upon advice that the Pleni-potentiaries of His Majeffy of Great Britain, as likewife thole of the Mott Christian King, were ready to begin their journey to Nineguen, the place appointed for the Treating a g neral Peace, have likewile commanded their Ambaffai ors to be ready to depait forthwith ; fo that if the Plenipotentiaries of the other Parties are as forward as those abovementioned, it s Obly faires are as however as take abovementioner, it is thought the Co grefs may be yet begun before the end of this month. The Letters by the laft Orsinary from Hambig gb_{j} tell us of forme Action that bath lately paffed at the siege of *Wilmar*, the Dans having made an Attack upon the place, but they diverse in the account they give of the forester, for they dilagree in the account they give of the fuccefs : for fome fay, that the Dane, were reputied with the lofs of a great many Men on their fide; others, that after a fharp dispute they gained certain Outworks, fo that we must expect ull the arrival of our next Letters from those parts, to have a certain and particular information. The Sicur Binches, who commands the Dutch \$quadron of Men of War that was with the Danifa Heet in the Baltique this Summer, hath upon his reprefenta-tion, that it would be very inconvenient to remain with the fail Men of War in these parts this Winter, obtained Orders to return home with his Squadron, and fuch Merchantmen as shall be ready to come with him.

Paris, Decemb. 14. There is but little news at prefent to write from hence, for you have already been told of the great preparations that are making in this Kingdom againft the next Campagne, though in the mean time there feems not wanting a good dirpofition to Peace : and in order thereunto, we expect every day to hear that our Plenipotentiaries are on their journey to Nimeguen, where they will doubtlefs arrive with the firft. We had a report fome days in Town, that the Prince of Conste had received Orders to return forthwith to the Rhanein order to fome great Adion, but it ferms to be meerly a report. Here are lately arrived two Extraordinary Couriers from Bourdeage, and though we know not the fubject of their Errand, yet it is generally believed, that the Marelenal d' Afbres the Governor, has written to the King to intercede in the behalf of that City, which now bears the punish ent of the diforders and mutipies it wasguilty of this last summer.
