**T**HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Septimus Robinson, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,

An Act for the more effectual Preservation of Fish, in Fish-Ponds and other Waters; and Conies in Warrens; and for preventing the Damage done to Sea Banks, within the County of Lincoln, by the breeding Conies therein.

An Act for enlarging the Terms and Powers of Two Acts, of the Thirteenth of George the First and of the Sixteenth of his late Majesty, for repairing several Roads, leading from the Town of Warmminster, in the County of Wilts; and for amending several other Roads near the said Town; and for repealing so much of an Act, made in the First Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing several Roads therein mentioned, in the said County, as relates to the Road within the Town of Heytesbury; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of so much of an Act, made in the Twenty-seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, for repairing several Roads, in the Counties of Dorset and Devon, as relates to the Road from Penn Inn, in the County of Dorset, to the Workhouse at the East End of the Town of Honiton, in the County of Devon, and to the Road from the Intrenchment on Askerfswell Hill to Penn Inn, and from Bridport to Beamister; and for repairing and amending several other Roads, therein mentioned, in the Counties of Dorset and Devon.

An Act for repairing and widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from the Turnpike Road on Hurst Green, in the County of Sussex, through Etchingam and Burwash, to the Extent of the said Parish of Burwash, in the said County.

An Act to continue the Term, and alter and enlarge the Powers of an Act, passed in the third Year of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening, turning, and keeping in Repair, the Road from the Town of Cambridge to Ely, and from thence to

Sobani; and for building a Bridge cross the River Ouze, at or near a Place called Strettham Ferry, in the County of Cambridge; and for repairing and widening and making several other Roads adjoining to the Roads directed to be repaired and widened by the said Act.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads leading from the Turnpike Road at Kipping Cross, in the Parish of Brenchley, in the County of Kent, through the Parishes of Brenchley, Horsmonden, and Goudhurst, by the Left Hand Side of Iden Green, to the Turnpike Road on Wilsley Green, in the Parish of Cranbrooke; and from a Place near Goudhurst Gore, through the Parish of Marden, to Stile Bridge, in the said Parish; and from Underden Green in Marden aforesaid, to Wanshatts Green, in the County of Kent.

An Act for amending the Road from the Pinfold, in Balby, in the County of York, to Workshop in the County of Nottingham.

An Act to continue the Term, and enlarge the Powers, of an Act passed in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from Mullen's Pond, in the County of Southampton, to the Eighteen Mile Stone from the City of Salisbury, and several other Roads in the said Act mentioned; and also for repairing and widening several other Roads, leading out of the said Roads; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the Terms and Powers of several Acts of the Ninth and Twelfth Years of Queen Anne, and of the Thirteenth of King George the First, and of the Fourteenth of His late Majesty, for Repairing the Highways leading from Roxton, in the County of Hertford, to Wansford Bridge, in the County of Huntingdon, so far as relates to the Middle and South Divisions of Roads comprised in the said Acts; and for Amending the Road from the Town of Huntingdon, to the Causeway, at or near the West End of the Town of Somersham, in the said County of Huntingdon.

An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road, leading from the Turnpike Road at Wrotham Heath, in the County of Kent, to the Turnpike Road leading from Croydon to Godstone, in the County of Surrey.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from Tonbridge to Maidstone, and from Wat's Cross to Cowden, in the County of Kent.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads, from the South End of Newton Abbot, to the Passage Way in Kingswear, opposite Clifton Dartmouth Hardness; and from the End of a Lane leading out of the Turnpike Road, between Newton Abbot and Totness towards Abbots Kerswell, to Five Lanes, and from Langvers Barn, to the said Turnpike Road, between Newton Abbots and Totness; and from Galmpton Warborough, to Monks Bridge and Brixham Quay; and from Langvers Barn, to the North End

*End of Paington Town, all in the County of Devon. An Act for amending and widening the Road, from the Sign of The Coach and Horses, in Birball, to the Turnpike Road, at Nubbrook; and from Bradley Lane, to the Town of Hudderfield, in the West Riding of the County of York.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Keyberry Bridge to the Passage at Shaldon, and from the said Bridge to the Pier or Harbour of Forkey, in the County of Devon.*

*An Act for continuing the Terms of several Acts, and for giving further Powers, for repairing the Road leading from Chapel on the Heath, in the County of Oxford, to Bourton on the Hill, in the County of Gloucester.*

*An Act for enlarging the Powers of several Acts, for repairing the Road from Stump Cross, to Newmarket Heath, and from the Town of Cambridge, and from Foulmire, to Cambridge, and other Roads adjoining thereto, so far as the same relate to the Road from Foulmire to Cambridge, and the said other Roads adjoining thereto.*

*An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road from Welford Bridge, in the County of Northampton, through Husbands Bosworth and Great Wigston, to Milston Lane, in the Town of Leicester.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Great Grimsby Haven, at or near a Place called the Upper Sand End, to Wold Newton Church; and from Nuns Farm, to the Mill Field, in the Parish of Irby, in the County of Lincoln.*

*An Act for re-building the Parish Church of Alhallowes on the Wall, in the City of London; and for re-building the House belonging to the Rector of the said Parish; and for purchasing several Pieces of Ground and Tenements thereon, to render the Passages to and from the said Church and House more commodious.*

*An Act for cleansing and lighting the Streets, Lanes, and Passages, within the Towns of Manchester and Salford, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; and for providing Fire Engines and Firemen, and for preventing Annoyances, within the said Towns.*

*Stockholm, April 2.* The Prince Royal, Prince Frederick, and the Princess, who have had the Measles at Ulrichsdal, are in a fair Way of Recovery.

*Vienna, April 3.* A Courier arrived this Week from Spain with an Account, that the Departure of the Infanta from Madrid was fixed for the 16th of June: In Consequence of which, their Imperial Majesties have fixed their Journey to Inspruck for the last Week in that Month.

*Copenhagen, April 6.* The King and Queen of Denmark, together with the three Princesses, propose going on Thursday next to Friedensburg, to pass the Summer there as usual.

*Turin, April 6.* The Dutchess of Savoy was this Morning safely delivered of a Prince, and her Royal Highness is as well as can be expected in her present Situation. The new-born Prince has been christened, and is to be called, Le Duc de Genevois.

*Berlin, April 6.* Last Wednesday Prince Ferdinand, the King of Prussia's Brother, with the Princess his Consort, set out for Schwedt, where the Margravine continues very dangerously ill. The King of Prussia is so well recovered from

his late Fit of the Gout, as to be able to walk about; but has not yet been out of his Room.

*Berlin, April 9.* Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, is expected To-morrow at Spandow, in order to assist at the Exercise and Manœuvres of his Regiment, which is in Garrison at that Place.
