*Stockholm, April 30.*

**T**HE King came to Town on Sunday Evening, to be present at the Anniversary Ceremony of his Orders; but no new Knights were to be installed on this Occasion. All the Royal Family, except the Prince Royal, were at the Comedy Yesterday Evening, and afterwards returned to Ulricksdahl.

*Copenhagen, May 7.* The Queen Dowager, who has been much indisposed during all the last Winter, is now pretty well recovered, and intends to remove next Week to Hirschholm, her usual Place of Residence in Summer. The two Princes will also soon set out for Fridericksberg.

Count Wurmbrant, the Imperial Minister, will accompany his Lady to Vienna, where she is going to lye-in; and Baron Sellich, who is charged with the Affairs of the Imperial Court during that Minister's Absence, was presented by him Yesterday to Baron Bernstorff.

M. d'Osten, the Danish Envoy at Peterburgh, is recalled, and is to be succeeded in the same Character by Baron d'Assembourg.

*Naples, May 7.* Commodore Harrison in the Centurion, and Captain Elliot in the Thames Frigate, are arrived here; and on Sunday the Commodore was presented to his Sicilian Majesty, who was pleased to allow him the Entrée after Dinner.

*Warsaw, May 8.* This being the King of Poland's Name-Day, the same was celebrated for the first Time since his Accession to the Throne. His Majesty has instituted a new Order, wore with a Red Ribband, by the Name of St. Stanislas; and has created 25 Knights, all his own Subjects.

*Vienna, May 11.* The Court comes to Town this Evening, in order to celebrate here the Empress's Birth-Day, which will be on Monday next.

*Berlin, May 7.* The King of Prussia is perfectly recovered, and assists on Horseback at the Manœuvres of the Troops at Potzdam. His Majesty is expected at this Place the 19th of this Month, in order to make the Grand Review of the Troops here.

*Berlin, May 11.* Early this Morning his Royal Highness Prince Henry, the King's Brother, set out from Spandau for Schwedt, to pay a Visit to the Margravine of Schwedt, who is pretty well recovered of her late dangerous Illness.

*Berlin, May 14.* Last Sunday Morning the King of Prussia reviewed Three Regiments of Infantry, the Regiment of Gens d'Armes, Ca-

valry, and That of Ziethen, Hussars: His Majesty then returned to Charlottenbourg, where he dined with several General Officers; and in the Evening set out for Potzdam.

Yesterday his Royal Highness Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, returned to Spandau from Schwedt, where he had been to make a Visit to the Margravine his Sister.

*Hague, May 17.* The late missing Transport, with the Dutch Troops on Board from the Berbices, which had put into the Isle of Rhé, is since got safe into the Texel, and the Regiment is now all assembled at Bergen-op-Zoom to refit.

This Day Baron Dewitz, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Mecklenburg Schwerin, and the Duke of Mecklenburg Strelitz, had an Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

To which he was introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.
