The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable Frederick Campbell, Esq; commonly called Lord Frederick Campbell, and Thomas Viscount Weymouth, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Thomas Viscount Weymouth, Lieutenant General and General Governor of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

Vienna, May 15. The Court returned last Night to Laxemburgh, where they will remain till Whitsunday. In the Morning General Lascey's Regiment, which is in Garrison here, was reviewed, and their Appearance gave much Satisfaction: It is thought to be one of the finest Regiments of Infantry in the Austrian Service.

Florence, May 18. Monday last, being the Empress's Birth-day, Marshal Botta celebrated it in the usual Manner, by a great Dinner, and an Assembly for the Nobility of both Sexes in the Evening.

Dresden, May 20. The Court intends to go the 13th of next Month to Pilsnitz, a Palace situated on the Elbe, about Six English Miles from this Place, and to reside there during the Summer Season.

Berlin, May 21. Last Sunday Afternoon the King of Prussia, with the two Princes, his Nephews, arrived at Charlottenburgh from Potsdam; and Yesterday his Majesty came into Town, after having made a special Review of the Regiments of Prince Henry and of Durlinghoven. This Morning the Troops of this Garrison, making about 20,000 Men, marched to the Plain of Toploff, two English Miles distant, where they were reviewed by his Prussian Majesty, and gave great Satisfaction: Prince Henry of Prussia was on this Occasion second in Command to the King his Brother. The Review ends Tomorrow, after which the King of Prussia returns to Potsdam.

Hamburg, May 24. A few Days ago the young Princes of Holstein Gottorp passed through this City in their Way to Bern. And on Wednesday last Count Würmbrand, Minister from their Imperial Majesties to the King of Denmark, arrived here from Copenhagen, in his Way to Vienna, and proceeded on his Journey this Morning.
