St. James's, June 4.

**T**HIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

*Copenhagen May 25.* On Monday last the King of Denmark came to Town: His Majesty dined by the Way with the Queen-Mother at Hirschholm, where he was met by the two young Princes. His Majesty only passed the Night in this City, and returned the Day following to Friedensbourg.

Last Wednesday the Prince Royal reviewed his own Regiment of Infantry, who went through their whole Exercise, commanded by his Royal Highness in Person.

*Berlin, May 25.* Wednesday and Thursday last the Troops assembled here for the Review, were again drawn up in the Plain of Temlow, and exercised before his Prussian Majesty, who was extremely well pleased with them. A great Number of the General Officers had the Honour of dining every Day with his Majesty during his Stay here. Thursday in the Afternoon his Majesty went to Charlottenbourg, where he remained till this Morning, and then set out with his Nephews, the Prince Royal and young Prince Henry of Prussia, and the two Princes of Brunswick in this Service, for Custrin and Stargardt, in order to review the Troops assembled in those Places. His Royal Highness Prince Henry the King of Prussia's Brother, likewise set out this Morning from hence for his Country-Seat at Rhinsberg. The several Regiments, that had been ordered hither for the Review, marched out of this Place on Friday Morning early for their respective Garrisons.

*Hague, May 31.* The Prince of Orange sets out for Loo on Monday next.

His late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrent Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter

to Mr. Belfon, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, as soon as possible, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 1st of July, to the 31st of December, 1764, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Office of the Treasurer of the Navy in Broad Street, on Monday and Tuesday the 17th and 18th of next Month, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, viz. To Captains and their Attorneys, and other Officers appearing themselves, on the Monday; and to Attorneys of Lieutenants, Masters and Surgeons, on the Tuesday, (after which the Lists will be recalled once a Month) that all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable unto them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid their Half-Pay; but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty; and in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.
