ceeding Two Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ownee Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. every Diftance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above fuch Two Hundred, and for every fuch fur-ther Diftance within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Vessel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the British Dominions, where Posts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Postmaster of fuch Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and fuch as may be brought by Vessels liable to Quarentine, which last are to be delivered to the Perfons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are for-warded by the Poft. And that all Mafters, Mariners, Passengers, &c. neglecting to deliver the Letters as aforefaid, shall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Poltmaster shall take for every Letter brought by fuch Veffel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the same.__

That Letters conveyed in Great Britain and Ireland, not exceeding one Stage, fhall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Oance Four Pence. And in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages. Single Two Pence, Dou-ble Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence ; but thefe Rates are not to affect the Penny-Poft.

That Letters paffing between England and Ireland, through Carlifle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donag badee, shall pay the same Rates of English, Scotch, Irish, and Packet Poltage, according to the Diltance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are fettled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be fent by the Penny-Post; unless com-

ing from, or paffing thereby to the General Polt. That Letters paffing between London and Hamburgh fhall pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Germany, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office fecreting or destroying any Letter; Bag or Mail of Letters, con-taining any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Writing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or Real-ing out of any Letter any fuch Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, fhall fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery shall, on Conviction, suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrulled to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or deftroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Poftage, Ihall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Let-ters under his Care, deserting the same before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other, Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along therewith ; or loitering on the Road ; or not, in all poffible Cafes, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, be fent to the House of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor lefs than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, fingly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or causing the fame to be unlawfully con-veyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter fo unlawfully collected,

conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, thall be fent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor lefs than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this A&, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great Britain

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between London and Hamburgh; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be fent by the Penny-Polt, commence from the Fifth of July All other Regulations, Rates of Poflage, Pains, next. Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, com. mence from the Tenth Day of October next.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is

pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, who shall discover, and prosecute to Conviction, any one or more of the faid Offenders.
