Florence, July 13. AST Week the Prince of Stigliano passed by here on his Way to Genoa. He is charged with a Prefent of Jewels that the King of Naples fends to his The Conftable Colonna, after having Sifter. performed, as ufual, the Ceremony on St. Peter's Day of prefenting to the Pope the Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples, left Rome, and paffed here likewife for Genoa, whither many are gone from hence,

Venice, July 17. The Senate has refused to put the Bishop of Sebenico in Possession of the Temporalities of his Bishoprick, because the Pope choic another Billiop, inftead of one of the three whom the Senate had nominated, as ulual, for that See.

On the 17th Instant, in Genoa, July 20. the Afternoon, the Spanish Squadron arrived in this Port, in Twenty-three Days, from Car thagena, confifting of One Ship of Eighty Guns, Eight Ships of Seventy Guns each, Two Sambechines of Twenty-eight and Thirty-two Guns, Two Tartans, and Two Transport Polaccas, commanded in Chief by Marquis del Viltoria Don John Joseph Navarro, who carried the Royal Spanish Standard at the Maintop Gallant Maft Head; the Second Commander in Chief is Rear Admiral Don Blas de la Barreda. Upon the Spanish Squadron's Approach near the Port, it was faluted by His Majefty's Ships Centurion and Guadaloupe, with Twenty one Guns each; the Centurion having been dreffed, let fly all the Colours; and as foon as the Spanish Admiral came into Port, the Prince's Louifa-Mary was faluted from the City with 101 Guns. next Morning the Princels came afhore in Admiral Navarro's Barge, faluted by all the Ships of the Spanish Squadron Three Times with Twenty-one Guns from each Ship. The Princefs went immediately to the Palace where the Prince's of Parma was lodged; and, after the mutual Compliments, both Princeffes went to the Palace that had been prepared by the Republic, followed by all the Gentlemen and Ladies of the Courts of Vienna, Madrid and Parma, and the Ambailadors and Ministers of the Courts of Spain, France and Naples. The Notarial Acts being read and exchanged, the Infanta from Spain was delivered into the Cuftody of the Ladies fent by the Court of Vienna to receive and accompany that Princefs to Infpruck; and the Infanta of Parma was, by the Ladies of that Court, delivered into the Care of those appointed by the Court of Spain to receive and conduct that Princess to Madrid. The same Afternoon the Infanta Area Dutchefs received the Compliments of the Republick's Deputation of Gentlemen and Ladies; and in the Evening both the Princefles went to the Theatre, where they staid to fee only the first A& of the Opera.

Yesterday Morning all the Nobility paid their Compliments to the Infanta from Spain. A few Hours before, a Courier came from Alexandria,

and brought the News, that the Duke of Parma died in that City the 18th Inflant, at Seven o'Clock at Night, after a fhort Illness of Five Days: It has plunged the young Princels his Daughter into the deepeft Sorrow, and all the Ladies, &c. attached to her Perfon, are going into Mourning; the Public Diversions, intended for the Amusement of the Two Princesses during their Stay here, are ftopped, and it is believed will be entirely laid afide. The Arch-Dutchess is to begin the Journey for Inspruck the 23d Inftant.

Berlin, July 27. Last Wednesday the Queen of Prussia gave, at Schonhausen, her Summer Palace, a grand Supper and Ball, at which the Reigning Duke, his Brother Prince Ferdinand, and the Hereditary Prince of Brunfwick, affifted. The next Day, after taking Leave of her Pruffian Majefty, and the reft of the Royal Family here, they fet out for Brunfwick. Two Days ago the Dutchefs of Brunfwick left Potzdam, in order to pay a Visit at Schwedt to the Margravine her Sister; from thence she is to return to Brunfwick. Her Royal Highness the Hereditary Princefs is also fet out with her Retinue for Brunswick.

Hi, Royal Highness the Duke of York having expressed a Defire of seeing some of the Prussian Troops exercife, the King of Pruffia was pleafed to order feven Battalions of Infantry, Part of the Troops which compose a Garrison, to be exercifed in the Thier Garden before his Royal Highnels, who expressed the greatest Satisfaction at the different Evolutions they performed, and the fine Appearance they made.

### Whitehall, August 6.

The King has been pleafed to conflitute and appoint the Right Honourable Charles Earl Cornwallis to be one of His Majefty's Aids du. Camp; and to take Rank as Colonel of Foot.

Which faid Paper Writing was tied with Packtbread to a Piece of dry Mortar, by which Means it was thrown over the Wall belonging to the faid Garden: His Majefly, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing the said Paper, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who wrote the faid Paper) who shall discover his or her Accomplise or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be Accomplices when and convicted thereof.
