

Imperial Colours; and To-day, being the Anniversary of St. Leopold, they hoisted the new Colours of the present Great Duke; which are, a red Field, cross the Middle of which is a white Bar, with the Arms of his Royal Highness blazoned in the Centre.

Berlin, November 19. The Hereditary Prince and Princess of Courland, who arrived here about a Fortnight ago from Arolsen, having paid their Court to the King and Queen of Prussia, and the rest of the Royal Family, set out from hence last Saturday, in order to proceed on their Journey to Mittau.

Copenhagen, November 20. Their Danish Majesties are expected at the Palace of Christiansberg on Friday next; and before the End of the Week all the Royal Family will have taken up their Residence there for the Winter.

The Hereditary Prince of Nassau-Soerbruck, attended by Lieutenant Colonel de Palissary, is lately arrived, and proposes to spend the Winter here.

The Friedensberg, Capt. Swane, a Ship belonging to the Asiatick Company, set Sail from hence a few Days ago for Canton; and the Prince Royal, Capt. Jenner, designed for Bengal, is almost ready to sail.

The Isle of Fuhnen, which suffered extremely some Years ago, by the Mortality amongst the Horned Cattle, but had lately so far recovered its usual Stock, that no visible Trace of that Calamity remained, is again visited by the same Epidemical Distemper, which now rages, as we hear, with great Violence all over that Country.

Whereas my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have received authentick Information, that between the Hours of Eight and Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 18th Day of July last, as a Merchant-Ship or Galliot, called the Lady Gabitta of Bremen, Hendrick Beckman, Master, laden with Linen Cloth and other Merchandize, was sailing from Bremen, for the Port of Bristol, the said Ship or Galliot was piratically and feloniously attacked on the High Sea, in the British Channel, off Beachy-Head, by a Ship or Vessel looking like a Cutter, with a long English Pendant, the Master and Crew whereof, being Englishmen, did then and there, by Force, plunder and rob the said Ship or Galliot called the Lady Gabitta, of a great Quantity of Linen Cloth, to a considerable Value, in Violation of the Laws of Nations; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of the said Piracy and Robbery, are pleased to promise a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Six Months

from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the above-mentioned Offence, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esquire, Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, who shall, within the Time aforesaid, discover and prosecute to Conviction, any one or more, other or others, of the said Offenders.
