Petersburg, April 1.

THE Emperors went to Sarfko Zelo on Saturday last, and, it is supposed, will continue there till Easter.

Prince Dolgorucki, who commanded the Russian Troops in Lithuania, is recalled, and M. Nicholas Soltikoff, a near Relation of the Field Marshal of that Name, is sent to succeed him.

Dresden, April 15. Yesterday Count Palfi, Son-in-Law to the late Marshal Daun, and Chambellan to the Emperor, arrived here Express to notify the Celebration of Marriage between Prince Albert of Saxony and the Arch-dutcheſs Christina, and brought with him very valuable Presents from that Prince for some particular Officers of this Court.

Prince Maximilian is in a promising Way of Recovery from the Small Pox.

Copenhagen, April 15. The French Ambassador, having received his Letters of Revocation, purposes to set out next Month.

Trinity Sunday is appointed as a Day of general Supplication throughout His Majesty's Dominions, to obtain the Almighty's Blessing on his Reign.

Hamburg, April 18. The Burghers were assembled Yesterday, and granted a double Tax upon Houses, which will bring in about 30,000 l. Sterling, to replenish their Finances.

Hague, April 25. An Account has been received here, that the Reigning Dutcheſs of Brunswick is taken ill with the Small Pox.

St. James's, April 29.

On Sunday last Sir Andrew Mitchell, Knight of the Bath, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the King of Prussia, had the Honour, on taking his Leave, to kiss Their Majesties Hands: And Yesterday he set out for the Court of Berlin.
