Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Wednesday the 1st Day of this instant October, a threatening Letter was thrown into the House of William Bell, of the Town of Trowbridge in the County of Wilts; which said threatening Letter was directed as hereunder, and contained the Words following, viz.

" To
" J Cook
" in
" Duck Street
" Trowe"

" Trobridge and Bradford
" Dam you Long Jack and you Bell as I under
" Stand you are Going to takeing up of som of
" the mob wick the first man that is taken up dam
" us if we dont be Revenge of you and all your
" Effects be Longing to You, so I would have you
" take care wat you are going upon and consider
" for the Best, and before worst come of it, for it
" is but a short time you Both have to Live if you
" go anny farther in this affair so I will Rest till you
" hear further of us so I am

" you Savt
" flames is hot and hell is hoter"

And that, on Saturday the 4th Day of this said Instant October, about Eight o Clock in the Evening, a Hay-Rick of the said Mr. Bell's, contiguous to the said Town of Trowbridge, was set on Fire, and one half thereof consumed, or spoiled, before the said Fire could be extinguished: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said threatening Letter, and in setting the said Hay-Rick on Fire, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said threatening Letter, or fired the said Rick) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
