His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said anonymous threatening incendiary Letter, and in putting it under the Threshold of the Shop-Door of the said James Poole, as above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That Jonathan Gleed (who keeps the Rose Tavern in the Parish of St. Michael at Plea, in the City of Norwich) did, on Friday the 17th Day of this Instant October, about Twelve o'Clock at Night, after the Company he had had that Evening at his House were gone, upon his going to set up some Tobacco-Dishes on a Shelf in the Passage or Entry of his said House, near the Street Door, where his Tobacco-Dishes were usually kept, find upon a Tobacco-Dish on the said Shelf, which had not been used that Evening, but which stood nearest the street Door of his said House, an anonymous threatening incendiary Letter, directed, as hereunder, and containing the Words, Letters, and Figures following, viz.

"Oct. 16, 1766.

"The party with whom I am their Chief and was an Eye Witness to your generosity and lenity to which chiefly you owe your Protection amidst the Variety of Passions that have Inflamed the breast of an Injured and Inraged people they have launched frequently upon Inconiums of you and hope you will further merit their good Will—the Subsequent discours is particularly adapted to you and the Corporation which is in brief, as follows,——We are a select body which are determined at all Events to chastise monopolizers, and those particular Gentlemen whose distinguished bravery was Evident in defeating a few miserable wretches? the City had been of a flame last night, which was Thursday, but I used all the Eloquence I was Master of and got leave to write to you which is the last time I can intercede in your behalf the time draw near if you have a mind to save the City and yourself immediately on Saturday Morning alter the price of most Estates for the present—in the interim I'll do all I durst to prevail upon them which will be impossible without such an Alteration—therefore for God Sake if you have any regard for your own Safety do what is commanded or expect the dire

Event, as for the poor Soldiers I pity them for by God we neither give nor receive Quarter but are determined to perish by the Swoird as death will be a deliverance—The land is fertile and bring forth well cultivated fruits in due Season but knavery on one hand and policy on the other have made things thus artificially dear but woe to Mr Pooll—the attack will begin in four different parts and those that do not fall by the Sword shall by the flames—You will be out of danger for you can look of this noble Sentence of Horace without any check. Hic murus ahenous eito nil concere sibi nulla pallefcere culpa."
