THE following Address of the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the City of Edinburgh, has been presented to His Majesty by James Courts, Esq; Representative in Parliament of the said City: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council, of the City of Edinburgh, in Council assembled, acknowledge, with becoming Gratitude, the Goodness of Divine Providence in granting a safe Delivery to our most gracious Queen; and giving us, by the Birth of a Princess Royal, an additional Security for the Continuance and Increase of that national Glory and Felicity, which have so remarkably distinguished these Realms since the Accession of your Illustrious Family to the British Throne.

Upon this happy Event, no less auspicious to your People than grateful to your Majesty, be pleased, Great Sir, to accept our most humble and hearty Congratulations: And permit us, at the same Time, to express our sincere Joy for the Strength that must be derived to the Protestant Interest, both at Home and Abroad, from the more intimate Connexion betwixt Great Britain and Denmark, that hath so lately been established by the Marriage of the Princess Caroline Matilda, your Royal Sister, with his Danish Majesty.

The Condescension with which your Majesty hath attended to the Supplication of your People, in the alarming Prospect of approaching Scarcity, is a fresh Proof of your Wisdom and paternal Care, as no Measure, in our Apprehension could have occurred more salutary on such a pressing Occasion.

Constantinople, September 15. Baron Penkler, the late Imperial Internuncio, sat out from hence on Saturday upon his Return to Vienna; and M. Gehler, the Danish Envoy, sails for Marseilles To-day, in order to proceed through France and Germany on his Return to Copenhagen.

Last Tuesday the Polish Envoy Extraordinary had his Audience of Leave of the Grand Signor, and is to have that of the Grand Visir immediately; and soon after to depart.

The Captain-Basha is made Basha of Candia, and the Basha of Candia succeeds as Captain-Basha. The Cadeleskier of Romania is turned out of his Office.

Florence, October 14. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick sat out last Saturday for Lucca, from whence he proposes to go to Leghorne and Pisa. The Great Duke and Dutchess shewed his Highness all possible Attention during the short Stay he made here; and the Lieutenant of the Posts was ordered to attend his Highness in his Tour, about Tuscany and to the Confines thereof.

A few Days ago Count Rosenbergh wrote circular Letters to all the Foreign Ministers here, to inform them of his being appointed to succeed Marshal Botta as First Minister and Grand Maitre.

The Great Dutchess has been out of Order since last Friday with a Fever.

Vienna, October 16. The Empress-Queen has been since Saturday last at Schlofshoff with Prince Albert and the Archdutchess Marie Christine, and will continue there till the 17th Instant. To-day being her Imperial Majesty's Name-day, it is celebrated at Schonbrun with great Solemnity. In the Morning the Emperor and Empress-Consort received the Compliments, on this Occasion, of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers, and Principal Nobility here. The Imperial Family dined afterwards in Publick, and in the Evening there will be a Drawing-Room; after which his Imperial Majesty sets out in order to join the Empress-Queen at Schlofshoff. This Day the Court quitted the Mourning for the late Emperor, and was, as might be expected, very brilliant.

Haarburgh, October 17. The Queen of Denmark arrived here at four o'Clock this Afternoon in perfect Health, and sets out To-morrow for Altona.

Copenhagen, October 18. The whole Court is now settled here, and every Thing is prepared for her Majesty's Reception.

Field Marshal Count Hamilton, Brother to the Senator of that Name, arrived here on Sunday last, to compliment the King of Denmark and the Royal Family, upon the Marriage of the Princess Sophia Magdalena with the Prince Royal of Sweden.

Last Night, between Seven and Eight o'Clock, her Royal Highness the Princess Royal was christened in the Great Council Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury: Her Royal Highness was named Charlotte-Augusta-Matilda: The Sponsors were, the King of Denmark, represented by his Grace the Duke of Portland, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household; the Queen of Denmark, represented by the Countess of Effingham, one of the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber in waiting; and her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa-Anne in Person.
