*Stockholm, November 4.*

**T**HERE was a Court at Dronningholm for three successive Days, which began the 28th of last Month.

The Princess Royal, after having received the Compliments of the Senate, and of the States, at Carlberg, arrived at Dronningholm in the King's Barge, accompanied by six others, about Five o'Clock in the Afternoon; where her Royal Highness was received at the Landing-Place by all the Officers of the Household, and was led by the Prince Royal to the Queen's Apartment, where the whole Court was assembled.

The first Compliments being over, the Royal Family dined together in Publick, the Foreign Ministers and all the Court attending; after which they were entertained at Dinner by the Grand Marshal, together with the Senators and other Persons of Distinction.

When Dinner was over they went to the Princess Royal's Apartment, and were presented to her Royal Highness by Count Thorn. In the Evening there was an Opera, and afterwards they supped with the King and the Royal Family; and the Whole was not ended till Three o'Clock in the Morning.

The second Day the Foreign Ministers and other Persons of Distinction dined at the King's Table. In the Afternoon the whole Court went to the Chinese House in the Park; where they were presented with Coffee; and as soon as the Company was returned to the Palace, the Ball began, which was followed by a Supper.

The third Day was passed in the same Manner, only the Coffee was served in the Princess Royal's Apartments; and instead of a Ball there was a Comedy.

On Friday the Foreign Ministers returned to Stockholm.

The Princess Royal has made her publick Entry this Morning; and the Marriage Ceremony is to be performed at Seven o'Clock this Evening in the Chapel Royal.

*Leghorn, November 7.* His Britannick Majesty's Consul has prevailed upon the Officers of the Health here to abolish the Quarantine, which has ever subsisted on all Ships and Vessels coming from the Island of Minorca, which was extremely inconvenient for the King's Ships, and prejudicial to the Commerce on that Island.

*Florence, November 8.* The Minister from Tripoli, who has resided here for some Months, set out Yesterday for Leghorn in order to embark for Tripoli, and is to be attended thither by one of the Great Duke's Snobs.

On the 4th Instant, being the Name-day of the King of Spain, there was Gala at Court; the Great Duke came to Town to receive the

Nobility, who were admitted to kiss his Hand, as usual; and he afterwards dined in State: The Great Dutchess's Health did not permit her to come to Town on this Occasion; but she had a Drawing-room in the Evening at the Palace in the Country, from whence the Court returned to Town Yesterday.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 11.* Her Danish Majesty made her publick Entry into this Capital on Saturday the 8th Instant; and on the Evening of the same Day the Royal Nuptials were solemnized in the Chapel of Christiansburg. As every Body seemed to vie in their Desire of testifying the Satisfaction this happy Union afforded them, the Splendor of the Entry was as great as can well be supposed. The Court has continued in Gala ever since, and proposes doing so to the End of this Week; during which Time the Festivities will last.

*Whitehall, November 22.*
