bound from Rotterdam to Leghorne, laden with Wheat, was, by a violent Storm of Wind, forced on Shore near Sidemouth in the Port of Exeter, where she was beat to Pieces, and the Cargoe entirely destroyed.

" to get Bread for Our Starving familise.
