A PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands Prorogued to Wednesday the Seventh Day of this Instant October; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued on the said Seventh Day of October to Tuesday the Twenty-fourth Day of November next: And we have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for Proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall on the said Twenty-fourth Day of November next be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Twenty-fourth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Second Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, in the Seventh Year of Our Reign.

*St. Iddefonso, September 14.* The Prince of Asturias still keeps his Chamber, but is much recovered from his late Accident.

*Stockholm, September 15.* Last Friday a Law was published here, declaring, that in Confe-

quence of the Measures taken by the States and their Secret Committee in the last Diet, the Course of Exchange should be fixed, for the Year 1768, at 42 Marks Copper for a Rix Dollar, Hamburg Banco, and proportionably for all other Money; forbidding any Person to bargain for Bills at a higher Price after the 1st of January next, under the Penalties prescribed by the Law which fixed the Exchange in 1766.

*Hague, September 29.* Accounts have been received, that the Prince of Orange arrived at Hanover the 24th at Night, in perfect Health; that his Serene Highness went to Brunswick the next Day, was expected to arrive at Magdebourg on the 29th, and to continue his Route for Potsdam the following Day.

*Dublin, September 24.*

Tuesday last being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower; and at Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices received the Ceraplanets of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle: The Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

St. James's, October 2, 1767.
