*Moscow, September 3.*

**T**HE Empress is at present at Kolomenskoi, and the Season being very fine, Moscow is almost empty.

*Copenhagen, September 26.* M. de Rantzau, Son-in-Law of M. Thott, died here some Days ago. The Post of Bailiff of Wordeburg, which he enjoyed, has been given to M. de Brokenhusen.

*Lisbon, September 26.* On Sunday last, an Auto da Fé was celebrated here, in which eleven Men and three Women received Sentence. Not one was condemned to die; and most of them were convicted of Offences, for which much heavier Punishments would have been inflicted on them, had they been proceeded against in the King's Temporal Courts. Since his most Faithful Majesty's Accession, the Burning of Hereticks has been disused.

*Berlin, October 3.* Last Thursday his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, attended by eight of the principal Officers of his Household, and about fifty Domesticks of all Denominations, arrived at Potzdam, where he dined with the King of Prussia; and the next Day he came with that Monarch to Berlin, where he was introduced to the Princess Wilhelmina, in the Presence of the Royal Family only. In the Evening there was a Ball in the Queen of Prussia's Apartments, to which the Nobility and Foreign Ministers were invited; and it is said the Marriage will be celebrated To-morrow Evening.

*St. James's, October 13.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto William Markham, Doctor of Law, and Dean of the Cathedral Church of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary in Rochester, the Deanry of the Cathedral Church of Christ in the University of Oxford, void by the Death of Doctor David Gregory, late Dean thereof.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing both, or either, of the said anonymous Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, or either of them, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
