The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park, November 2, 1767.

HIS Day about Noon the Queen was happily delivered of a Prince. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

This great Event was soon after made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns. Her Majesty is, God be praised, as well as can be expected; and the Young Prince is in persect Health.

Whitehall, November 3.

Y Esterday Morning, about Ten o'Clock, His Majesty's Yacht Mary came to an Anchor off Greenwich, with the Corpse of his late Royal Highness the Duke of York. About Three o'Clock in the Asternoon the Body was put on Board the Admiralty Shallop, and landed at Greenwich; from whence it was conveyed in a Hearse to the Prince's Chamber between Five and Six, preceded by the Coaches of their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Cumberland and Gloutester, and his late Royal Highness's State Coach, and followed by a Party of the Horse Guards, and a great Number of Coaches, &c. of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction. The Body lay in State in the Prince's Chamber this Day; and will be privately interred about Ten o'Clock at Night, in the Royal Vault in King Henry the Seventh's Chapel.

Minute Guns were fired from all the Yachts, from the Time of the Body's being put on Board the Shallop, till its Arrival in the Prince's Chamber.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act for preventing the excessive "Use of Spirituous Liquors, by laying additional Duties thereon; for shortening the Prohibition of making Low Wines and Spirits" from Wheat, Barley, Malt, or other Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran; for encouraging the Exportation of British-made Spi-" rits; and for more effectually fecuring the Duties payable upon Spirits, and preventing "the fraudulent Relanding or Importation "thereof"—It is enacted, amongst other Things, That if at any Time of Times after the Twenty-first Day of April, 1760, during the Recess of Parliament, the Price of Wheat shall exceed Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter, Winchester Measure, for Two successive Market Days in the Part of London and it shall ap-Days, in the Port of London, and it shall appear expedient to His Majesty, His Heirs or Succeffors, to prohibit the Making of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, from Time to Time, by His or Their Royal Proclamation or Proclamations, to be iffued by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, or by His or Their Order in Council, to be published in the London Gazetre, from Time to Time to prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines or Spirits from any Wheat, Barley, Malt, and any other Sort of Grain, and from Meal, Flour, and Bran, or any Mixture therewith, for any Time or Times
