Several Permilies of Morlachs formerly subject to the Turks Government, have deserted them, and are come into Zara in submission to this Republique, and tell of many others that have entertained the same design, and will suddenly sollow them; to which they will be incouraged by the great civilities shown by his Excellence, to those that have led the way.

Copenhagen, Novemb. 3. On Munday last the late concluded desensive Treary was brought hither from the Hagne to be ratisfied by this King, the next day arrived the Swedes Senator Monsieur Steno Bielke f om Germany, where he has been so from months. The P ince E'ester of Saxony is preparing for his return, a great part of his Train and Baggage being already gone by way of Niekoping; and the P ince intending to follow on Thursday next, though His Mijesty vies his endeavors to continue him here for some farther time.

Legorne, Novemb. 8. Here is lately a rived Madonna della Guordia. . French flup 22 days from Smyrna, with feveral letters confirming to us the former account of the Jews pretended Meffish, a ding that amongst the great numbers that flocked to him, a learned Jaw from Germany (others fay from Poland) had seven or eight days confe ence with him, who finding much vanity and weakness in his preteaces and arguments, I f him with much disfatisfaction, and repairing to the Turkish Mo que turned Turk, ceclaring Sabadai to'be an I postor, and it care were not taken, le might draw the Jews into a R. hellion e of whice, advice being sent to the Grand intio, Sabadai was by order carried to Adrianop'e, where being examined by the Chaymacham and Muftee, he was by them fent to the Grand Signio, in whole prefence. He, with one of his Fellows, feeely exci anged the Law of Moses for that of Mahomet, and was by the Grand Signior masse a Cappegee Basi, and called Mahomet: The same Letters tell us that the Grand Signior upon confi eration of the great expectations and endeavors of the Jews to promote the interest of their new pretended King, had given command for the cutting off all that Noticn from seven years old and upwards, which upon their humi-liation and intercession of the new Proselite was revoked; which the Jews look upon as a deliverance not inferior to that procured by Queen Either, and intend, in remembrance of it, to keep an anniversay feast of three days.

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By Letters from the same place we are advited, that the French and Ravez an Vessels that are now in that Port, are preparing for their departure, not knowing how the French Ambassador may succeed in his demands at Adrianople: they being informed from Constantinople, that during his abode there, he summoned all-the French together; destring them to provide for their departure out of the Tuskish Dominions, in case the Grand ignior woul; not be dissuaded from admitting the Genouese to the Levant trade.

Another French V stell arriving from Thoulon informs us, that two Men of War are string up in that Port, and may be ready to put to S. 3 in ten days to cruse in those seas: which is likewise construined by two other French ships from Marseilles, yesterday arriving in this Port: A ship of this place is also come in from Tunis, giving us notice that the Consures had taken the St. Peter a Genous se ship of 200 Tuns laden homewards with Corn from Tabarca.

Paris, Decemb. 1. The Chambre des grand jours proceeds vigorously at Nismes in the lower Languedoc, against several great Personages, having already imprisoned above 200 Gentlemen; and so satisfactorily to his M. jesty. That he is resolved to have the like Enquiries made in all Provinces successively, of the Crimes, Abuses and Injuries offered to the people, against their, and his interest: And, 'cis said, the Grand Surveyor of the High wayes is studently to be called to account here, for some Abuses in the execution of his Office; and particularly, for taking money of several Citizens of Paris, for his connivance at their intrenchments upon the streets.

Mounfieur Fouquet has of late more liberty given him than formerly, so as to converse with his Lady and Relations; and, his believed, will shouly be freed from his Imprisonment.

His Majesty intends to have a great Army on for against the next Spring, and 'tis thought he may have some design upon the new Fortification of Charle Roy.

The Count de Chouse, Lieutenant General of the Artillery of France an excellent Engineer, is gone for Bremen; and the Marquis de Chavigny, who commanded a Regiment in Piedmont, has fold his charge there, and in company with the Count is gone to serve at that Siege as a Voluntier. The Marquis de Bellefonds is gone to Sea in Captain du Quefness ship, who with his squadron are to secure the Seas this Winter.

The Baron de Pede, chief President of the Parliament at Aix, has renewed his Proposals to his Majesties Council, officing to entertain 12 Gallies at Sea on his own expence, upon condition his M jetty will grant him the Monopoly of Oyles and Soper, and that none shall deal in those Commodities without his Licence.

Order is given for building a Mole at Havre de Grace, and to make a Haven there, capable to receive and fecure One huncred great ships.

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Barwick, Novemb 20. The Mutiniers fince their exploit to Funfrieze, have (as it feems) been rambling abour Galloway, Carier, Kyle, and Cuningham; and in their rouling have raked together a crew of near 500 on Foot, and on Horfback, and amongst them several Tideves who make great spoils in the Countrey where they come. They have but few Arms among ft them, a great or most part of the Foot having got Scyths made flieight, and fallned to long Staves, with which they think to mow down thei Oppolers; but care is taken for their speed suppression; the Earl of Anandale, and Lord Dunlanrick, Rendezvouzing yesterday at Lecherbrigs with near 2000 Horle, and the Major-General Deret with 2000 Foot, and 500 Horse, being advanced as sar as Glasgow; besides several other Troops drawn together by the Earl of Galloway, and the Vicount of Kenmore. So that we may fuddenly expect the news of the suppression of the Rioters, and Reflauration of Peace to these disquieted Countreys,

Ditto, Novemb. 24. The 21 instant was published a Proclamation from the Council, at the Cross in Edenburgh, which is also to be published in other places of the Kingdom; by which, all the Ryoters are commanded in 24 hours time to submit themselves to the Lieutenant-General, and to His Mylessies elemency, or elie to be declared Rebels, with all such as shall hold intelligence with them, or any ways abet, affish, or countenance them; and an Oath to be trendred to all persons, both in Cities and Country, To be true and faintful to His Majesty, and defend His Authority, and maintain the same against this Insurrection and Rebellion, or any other that shall happen, with the hazard of life and fortune, and that they be ready at the first Summons.

The Mutiniers give themselves out to be many more then really their true numbers are. A party of them lie sculking at the Kirk of Fenick, within twelve miles of Glasgow, the Countrey where they are, being very barren, by which mens they will not be able to stay long in that place. Five of the Earl of Anandales Scouts met lately with twelve of those Rioters, who were also touting, two of the twelve upon the first view of an enemy fled, the other ten received the charge with the loss of two of their number, the other eight immediately flying, who were for some time pursued by the five, who returned with no other hutt, then a slight wound received by one of them.

We hear not yet of any person of condition that has been smonts them.

Whitehal, Novemb. 28. Yesterday in the Evening, the Right Honorable Sir Hugh Pollard Knight and Baronety Competeller of His Majesties Housthold, and one of His Majesties mest Honorable Vrivy Council, departed this Life, after an indisposition of several moneths. Whereupon His Majesty was pleased immediately to confer his place of Compttoller on Sir Thomas Clifford, and to receive him to the Honor of kissing His Hand upon it accordingly.
