Copenhagen, January 29.

LAST Night, about Ten o'Clock, the Queen of Denmark was safely delivered of a Prince, to the inexpressible Happiness of her Royal Consort, and the whole Court. Her Majesty and the new born Prince are this Morning both as well as can be expected. This very important and much desired Event happened but an Hour or two before the Anniversary of the King of Denmark's own Birth-day, which we are now celebrating with double Festivity. The Birth of an Heir Male to the Crown has completely fulfilled the ardent Wishes and Prayers of the Publick, and consequently spread a real Joy through all Ranks of People. Immediately after it was made known, the Foreign Ministers, and all the Nobility, waited upon the King, who was pleased to receive their Compliments of Congratulation, and to express the Satisfaction received from their Attention on this interesting Event. The King of Denmark bestowed several Marks of Favour on this happy Occasion. M. Vander Luhe was invested with the Order of the Elephant: Count Holck, elder Brother of the Marshal, and the Chamberlain Schavaliczky, had that of Dannebrog: The Counts of Ahlefeld, Moltke, and M. Lerche, were raised to the Rank of Chamberlain.

Berlin, January 20. Last Saturday the 24th, being the King of Prussia's Birth-Day, the Queen received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers; and in the Evening there was a grand Concert and Supper in her Majesty's Apartments; after which his Royal Highness Prince Henry gave a Masked Ball at his Palace, which lasted till Seven o'Clock next Morning. Some Days ago her Royal Highness Princess Ferdinand of Prussia was taken ill, but Symptoms of the Measles appearing soon after, she is thought now to be in a fair Way of Recovery.

Yesterday being the Birth-day of the Princess Dowager of Prussia, who entered into the 47th Year of her Age, her Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion; and in the Even-

ing there was a Ball and Supper in the Queen's Apartment. This Morning the Prince and Princess Royal of Prussia set out for Potsdam.

St. James's, February 10.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Weymouth, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, February 11.

This Day his Excellency the Count de Chatelet, Ambassador from France, had a private Audience of Her Majesty.

As had also M. Durand, Minister Plenipotentiary in the Absence of the Ambassador, to take his Leave.

And Baron Diede de Furstenstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, to notify the Birth of the Prince Royal of Denmark.

To which they were introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Harcourt, Lord Chamberlain to Her Majesty, and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Carleton-House, February 12.

This Day his Excellency the Count de Chatelet, Ambassador from France, had a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards of her Royal Highness Princess Louisa.

As had also M. Durand, Minister Plenipotentiary in the Absence of the Ambassador, to take his Leave.

To which they were introduced by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
