 Cracew, March 8 N Thefday last, about eight in the morning, our Queen was safely brought to Bed of a young Princess. His Majesty has now disposed of Several vacancies, as that of the great Mareschal of the Kingdom, to the Prince Lubomircki; That of Mareschal of the Court, to the Sieur Sin wsky; and of several Bishopricks, &c. The term of the Sellion of the Dyet is prolonged for eight dayet mo e; and according to the disposition the Members are at present in, we have reason to promise our selves a goo 'conclusion of it, to the fatisfaction of our Neighb is the Emperor, and the Elector of Brandenburgh: But at for the Turk is it's not doubted but the resolution will be taken to carry on the War with all vigor against them. It is said that the first vircular Letters have been already fent our for the convoking the Ban and Arrier-

ban of this Kingdom.

Madrid, March 12. The Viceroy of Catalbhia continues with great earneithels to follicire success from hence, for that the French will be strong on that side this Campagne, 4000 Horle, and 10 000 Foot; whereas on the other side, our Troops in those pares are very sew, and no way able to make head against the Enemy: They write from those pares, that the Miquetets, who were quartered in Figueras, had committed several disorders and infolences, having plundered two Neighbouring Villages, &c. We have with great satisfaction received the account of de Rusters being returned to Naples, so that now we are eased of the apprehensions we were in upon the news we had of his being about quitting the Medrerantan, and resultning home. Don Juan of Austrid continues at Saragoça, and at present there is not any talk of his coming to Court. It is believed the Portugat Armada, enhissing in 14 Men of War, is hy this time sailed from Liebon, for the Coast of Africa. The Duke of Albuquerque lies dangerously ill, without hopes of recovery.

Vienna, March 20. The Queen Dowager of Poland is ill of the Small Pox, but past all danger. The Imperial Minister at Cracom confirms, 35 we and told, what we heard before, of the disposition of the Dyer, to conclude a firm Peace with his Imperial Majesty; though he adds; that there were several of the Senators who opposed it. We shall now quickly know how far their opinions have prevailed, for when our last Letters came away from Gracow, the Dyct was to end in three or four days. We are told that an estimate bath been taken of the extraordinary charges his Imperial Majesty is at in this Warsand that they amount to to millions of Crowns, and that the Ministers are at present busied to raile this Sum, It hath been reported here, That the Prince of Transitumian and those of Moldavia and Wallachia 4 have brought together a considerable Body of Men, with intent to affift the Rebels, but that the Grand Signior had comman, ded them to put those Troops into his service, to be employed against Poland; but this meers not with any credit here.

stratburgh, March 23% On Friday fait the Governot

of Haguenam caused seven Wagons laden with Merchan I dizes that were going from hence towards Spire, to be stopped, notwithstanding they had a Passport of the Governor of Philipsburgh? It is believed Monfieur Verjus, the French Envoy, will not continue long here, fince our Magistraces have given him an answer little to his fatisfactions in the matter he came to propose kere on the part of the Most Christian King. The French Proops march from the Saar, Lorrain, and the Upper Alfaria, towards Saverne, where they are to form a Body of an Army, for the putting a Convoy into Philipsburgh. The 19 inflant, the French of that place marched our to the number of 6 or 700 Mens with intention to have falled upon some of the Posts which the Imperialists have latel ly taken in that Neighborkbod; but it feems thefe having an account thereof, way-laid them; and cut most of them off: for the Imperialists would not give them any quarter because of the devastations that have been made by that Garison in the Neighbouring Countries. Four hundred Women having been lately sent from Philips burgh, ad buy up Provisions in the Neighborhood, the Imperial Soldiers meeting with them, stript them stark naked, and fo drove them home again.

Disto, March 1%. The Mareschal de Rochesort having assembled 6 or 700b Men together in the Neightborhood of Saverne, had Resolved 40 put a Convoy into Philipsburgh, and accordingly he put himself on his marchy bir understanding that the Duke of Lornain had with several Imperial Troops passed the Rhine at Lauterburgh, and that they were much stronger than the Fortes he had with him, he did not think fit to attempt the execution of his intended design, but the Mareschal as we hear is returned to Merz in Lorrain. We expect in sew dayes the Mareschal de Montmoreney in whese

Estingen, March 17. The 21 instant, the Duke of Lorrain arrived here, and the fame day the Prince of Baden returned hither from his quarter at Rousheim, to confer with his Highness. The 24 they went together to Lauter burgh, to have an eye upon the Bnemy, who affembled a Body of an Army together at Saverne and Haguenam, with delign to pur into Philipsburgh a fopply of feveral things which that Garifon feems to be in much want of. But we fince understand, that the Enemy hath not thought fit to attempt any thing, and that their Forces are feparated again, wherefore our Troops are likewise returning to their quarters, and the Duke of Lor-rain is expected back here to motrow. We have ad-vice that the Mareschal do Mantmorency is arrived at Schlestadt. From Vienna we have Letters, of the 22 past, which tell us, that there was arrived a Turkish Chiaus, who had informed that Court, that the Grand Signior had resolved to send a splendid Embassy to his Imperial Majesty, to consum the Peace between the two Empires y That the Count of Montecuculi intended to part from Vienna towards these parts, about the end of the last month.
