**T**HE Chamber of Finances have given Notice, that the third Payment upon the three Millions of Florins, borrowed in the Year 1760, (and for which the several Comitatuses of Hungary were Security, the States not being at that Time assembled) will be made next August.

The Court removes To-morrow from Laxembourg to Schonbrun for the Rest of the Summer.

Dresden, July 9. The Court goes To-morrow into a Four Weeks Mourning for the late Queen of France, Advice of whose Death arrived here on Thursday Evening last.

**A**T the Court at St. James's, the 29th Day of June, 1768,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**I**T having been represented to His Majesty, that several Persons, who have obtained Orders of His Majesty in Council for Grants of Land in His Majesty's Island of St. John in North America, have neglected to take out such Orders, or, if taken out, to present them to His Majesty's Governor of Nova Scotia, by Means whereof His Majesty's Gracious Intentions, with Respect to the Settlement of that Island, may be defeated, and the Cultivation and Improvement thereof greatly obstructed and retarded; It is therefore this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of His Majesty's Colony of Nova Scotia, do forbear to pass any Grants, under the Seal of that Colony, of any Lots or Parcels of Land in His Majesty's said Island of St. John, unless His Majesty's Order in Council, directing the same, shall have been produced to him on or before the first Day of May, which shall be in the Year 1769: And that this His Majesty's Order in Council be published in the London Gazette, to the End that all Persons concerned may have due Notice thereof.

“ in Red as an Emblem of Our Designs.”

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in wrtiting the said anonymous threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
