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JOHAN Schultz, formerly Merchant and Native of the City of Königsberg in Prussia, who went and resided for some Time at Hamburg, afterwards went to London, and from thence, as is supposed, to Philadelphia, having been absent from Königsberg upwards of Thirty Years, and thought to be dead, his next of Kin have applied to the Burgher-masters and Senators of the said City of Königsberg, to have his Estate divided among them: Therefore Notice is hereby given to the said Johan Schultz if living, or to his Descendants, if he has left any, and to any Person or Persons that may be intitled to his Estate and Effects, or any Part thereof, by Virtue of any Will which he may have left, or upon any other Account, that they immediately, or at the latest on the 10th of November 1768, being the peremptory and preclusive Time appointed, do apply to the Magistrates of the said City of Königsberg, and make out their Claims to the Estate and Effects of the said Johan Schultz, otherwise they are to expect that Johan Schultz will be declared to be dead, and he, together with his Descendants, and all Claimants on his Estate and Effects, will be precluded from his Property at Königsberg, and that it will be adjudged to his Relations and Heirs there, who have made Application for the same.
