While we inculcate the Principles of Civil and Religious Liberty, it is with grateful and exulting Hearts we shew them, that, to be good Citizens, they must be faithful Subjects to a Sovereign, who is at once its Friend and Guardian.

We hope your Majesty will pardon our adding, that, in doing our Duty, we will expect the Protection of a Prince, who is, in every Respect, so religious an Observer of his own.

His late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: They are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose.
