**P**URSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That on the 15th Instant, the Ship Sally, Benjamin Berry, Master, laden with Wine and Shumack, from Oporto for Bristol, being off Lundy, bearing N. N. W. Wind at N. W. Distance about three Miles, the Weather being cloudy, thick, and squally; but soon after falling so little Wind, that he could have no Command of the Ship, and imagining himself to be farther to the Eastward than he really was, and being in Six or Seven Fathom of Water, he let go his small Bower, and, still driving, he let go his best Bower; but that at last she struck aboard, and came Broadside to; on which he with his Men took to their Boats, and got to the Burroughs, a Place within the Port of Barnstaple; and that upon inspecting the Vessel when the Tide had left her, it was found, that the best Bower had broke about Eighteen Inches from the Stock.

*Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That Mr. Frederick Brede, late of Racquet-Court, Fleet-Street, London, Jeweller, set out on Saturday the 15th Day of this Instant September, in a One-Horse Chaise, for Ware in Hertfordshire, and took with him One Hundred Pounds and upwards to purchase some Plate which was to be sold there; that he arrived safe at Ware, and the Sale being put off, he, on the Monday following, between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, set out from the Bull Inn at Ware, on his Return Home; but, between Eight and Nine o'Clock the same Evening, his Horse and Chaise were found in the Road, without him, a few Miles distant from Ware; the Chaise in a very dirty Condition, and the Front Leather much torn; on which strict Search was made after Mr. Brede, but he could not be found: And that the next Morning, on dragging the River, which lay close by the Road, his Body was found, with his Hands fast bound together with a Cord; that, on searching his Pockets, no more than Seven Shillings and Sixpence could be found: That the said Mr. Brede, before the Hundred Pounds he took with him, had a Silver Watch, with a Box and Case in one, which was wound up on the Dial-Plate, with a Silver Tail to the Locking-Spring; the Maker's Name, Rodet, London, No. 25 Number; that he had also a large black Pocket-Book, in which he usually carried Diamonds; and, it*

*is believed, had a Quantity of Diamonds in it; which Watch and Pocket-Book could not be found; and that it is therefore strongly suspected the said Mr. Frederick Brede was way-laid, and robbed and murdered, by some evil-minded Persons, and thrown into the River:*

*His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Robbery and Murder, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.*
