His Excellency George, Lord Viscount Townshend, Lord Lieutenant General, and General Governor of Ireland, his Speech to both Houses of Parliament, at Dublin, on Tuesday the 26th Day of December, 1769.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

**T**HE Attention you have shewn to the great Objects which have been particularly recommended by me to your Consideration, and the Provisions which have been made for the Safety and Security of this Kingdom, call upon me not only to express my Approbation of, but to thank you, as I now do, for your Conduct in these Particulars.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

It is with great Pleasure that I thank you, in His Majesty's Name, for the Supplies which you have granted, and the Provision which you have made, for the present Establishment, the public Credit, and the Safety of this Kingdom.

When I first met you in Parliament, as I knew, and could rely upon it, that nothing could move from His Majesty but what would be expressive of His constant and ardent Desire to maintain and preserve every Constitutional Right to His People, I little thought that any Thing would happen, during the Course of this Session, that could possibly affect the just Rights of His Majesty, and of the Crown of Great Britain, so as to afford His Majesty any just Cause of Dissatisfaction, and make it necessary for me, specially, to assert and vindicate those Rights.

It is therefore with great Concern that I have seen and observed, in the Votes and Journals of the House of Commons, printed by your Order, a late Proceeding by you, of such a Nature, and of such Effect, with respect to the Rights of His Majesty, and the Crown of Great Britain, as to make it necessary for me, on this Day, and in this Place, to take Notice of, and animadvert thereupon: I mean, the Vote and Resolution of the twenty-first Day of November last, by which you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, declare, that a Bill, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty the several Duties, Rates, Impositions and Taxes, therein particularly expressed, to be applied to the Payment of the Interest of the Sums therein provided for, and towards the Discharge of the said Principal Sums, in such Manner as is therein directed, which had been duly certified from hence to His Majesty, and, by His Majesty, had been transmitted in due Form, under the Great Seal of Great Britain, and which had been read a first Time by you, and which was rejected by you on that Day, was so rejected, because it did not take its Rise in your House.

This Vote, and this Resolution of yours, declaring that the said Bill was rejected, because it did not take its Rise in your House, being contrary to the Acts of Parliament of this Kingdom of the 10th of Henry the VIIIth, and the 3d and 4th of Philip and Mary, and the Usage and Practice ever since, and intrenching upon the just Rights of His Majesty, and the Crown of Great Britain, to transmit such Bills to be treated of and considered in Par-

liament here; I am now to assert His Majesty's Royal Authority, and the Rights of the Crown of Great Britain, in this Respect, and in such a Manner, as may be most public and permanent; and therefore I do here, in full Parliament, make my public Protest against the said Vote and Resolution of the House of Commons, by which you, Gentlemen of that House, declare that the said Bill was rejected by you, because it did not take its Rise in your House, and against the Entries of the said Vote and Resolution, which remain in the Journals of the House of Commons: And I do require the Clerk of this House now to read my said Protest, and to enter it in the Journals of this House, that it may there remain, to future Ages, as a Vindication of the undoubted Right and Authority of His Majesty, and of the Rights of the Crown of Great Britain, in this Particular.

In this Protest, I think myself warranted in all Respects; and if it needed, as I conceive it doth not, any other Strength than that which it derives from the Statutes which I have mentioned, and from the Usage and Practice, ever since, it would be found in that Precedent which appears in the Journals of this House of the 3d Day of November, 1692, under the Reign of that glorious and immortal Prince King William the Third, the Great Deliverer of these Kingdoms, and the constant and magnanimous Assertor and Preserver of the Civil and Religious Rights of Mankind.

After which the Lord Chancellor, by his Excellency's Command, said,

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

*IT is his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the 20th Day of March next, to be then here held: And this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the 20th Day of March next.*

**W**HEREAS there was this Day read at the Board a Letter from the Commissioners of Customs in Scotland to the Secretary of the Treasury, dated the 12th of this Instant, setting forth, That the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, as Preses of the Convention of the Royal Boroughs in Scotland, had informed them, that Mr. John Stuart, Deputy Conservator of the Scots Privileges at Campveer, had transmitted to his Lordship a Copy of a Placart published by the States of Zeeland, prohibiting, under certain Restrictions, the Importation of Hay



and Straw into the said Province, in apprehending the Infection rising in other Parts among the Horned Cattle had been spread by the Introduction of those Commodities; and informing his Lordship, that a Ship called the Peggy of Dyfert, John Spittle Master, had taken on Board a Parcel of Hay at Middleburgh, in order to be landed at Dyfert in Scotland; and his Lordship having desired that Orders might be given to the Officers of the Customs for delaying the Landing of the said Hay, the said Commissioners of the Customs, in regard to the Delicacy and Importance of the Matter, and to the Alarm and Apprehensions which such Importation under those Circumstances might occasion, had consulted His Majesty's Advocate, and agreeable to his Opinion they complied with the Request of the Lord Provost, and desired Directions from the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury upon this Occasion. And whereas it appears by a Letter from the Secretary of the Treasury to the Clerk of the Council in Waiting, that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, upon receiving the foregoing Information, had sent Directions to the Commissioners of the Customs at Edinburgh, to prevent the Importation of Hay and Straw from Foreign Parts into Scotland, until they should receive further Orders; His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, and approving of the Directions given by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury to the Commissioners of the Customs in Scotland thereupon, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to prohibit the Importation of Hay and Straw from Foreign Parts into any of the Ports of this Kingdom: And also to order and direct that the utmost Care be taken not to permit any Entry to be made for Hay or Straw, which is already or may hereafter be brought from Foreign Parts into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS it is a Practice with the Masters of several British Ships and Vessels from Ireland and the West Coasts of Great Britain, as well as from Spain, Portugal, and other Foreign Parts, freighted to Holland and Flanders, to give the Charge of their Ships to Persons pretending to be Pilots, but who in Reality are not so, at Dover, Deal, &c. in the Cinque Ports, for the Sake of Saving some small Expences; by which Means they trust to Men unskilled in Navigation, whereby many Ships and Vessels have been lost: For Instance, the Pink Robert and John, of North Yarmouth, George Reid, Master, from Liverpool to Ostende, was put on Shore, near the Mouth of the Harbour of Ostende, on the 27<sup>th</sup> of November last, by the Ignorance of the Person pretending to be a Pilot, and to whom, as such, the Master had given Charge of the Ship, and in a very little Time the Vessel and Cargo were totally lost, and Part of the Crew perished. To prevent such Accidents for the Future, Notice is hereby given to all Owners, Masters and Commanders of Ships and Vessels that may at any Time

be bound from Ireland, or the West Coasts of Great Britain, or from Spain, Portugal, Italy, or other Foreign Parts, to Flanders or Holland, or to any Port in France to the Eastward of Boulogne, That the Branch or Licensed Pilots at Dover, Deal, Ramsgate, and Margate are the only Persons properly qualified, and are ready at all Times to pilot Ships and Vessels to any Ports either in France, Flanders, or Holland; each of which Pilots undergo the strictest Examination before they can obtain their Branch or Licence; and two Vessels manned with Pilots, or such as are Candidates for that Employment, sail annually, with a certain Number of the Wardens, to examine the Coasts of Flanders and Holland; on which Service they remain Five, Six, or Seven Weeks, and, at their Return, report their Observations at the next Court of Loadmanage; which Report is communicated to all those Pilots who remain at their respective Stations. And that no Master or Commander of any Ship or Vessel may be deceived in regard to a Branch Pilot, the Pilots of the Cinque-Port Society have Directions to carry their Branches or Warrants always with them; in order to produce to every such Master or Commander. And it is hoped the Owners of all Ships will give particular Instructions to the Commanders of their Vessels to employ no Pilots but such as do produce their Branches or Licenses.

And the other dressed in a grey coloured Great Coat, a dark coloured second-mourning Coat, with black Buttons and Button-holes, dirty Leather Breeches, dark grey coloured Stockings, and a dark brown frizzled Wig, is about 5 Feet 4 or 5 Inches high, thick-set, and of a pale Complexion.
