**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land-Tax, to be raised in Great-Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and seventy.

An Act for continuing, and granting to His Majesty, certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and seventy.

An Act for indemnifying all Persons, with respect to advising or carrying into Execution His Majesty's Orders of Council, made for preventing the spreading of a contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle, and for rendering the same valid and effectual, and for preventing Suits in Consequence thereof; and to authorize the continuing, extending, and executing the same, for a further Time.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for amending the Road, from St. Stephen's Gate in the City of Norwich, to Block Hill in Trowse, at the Angle where the Road divides, to Bixley and Kirby, in the County of Norfolk.

And to Four Private Bills.

For the Discovery of any Person or Persons, who maimed and hamstringed, in the Night, any Sheep depasturing on an Estate belonging to Lord Willoughby de Broke, the Sum of FIFTY POUNDS.

For the Discovery of the Person or Persons, who shot into the House of Mr. Watson of Algarthirke, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS.

For the Discovery of the Person or Persons, who shot into the House of Mr. Barlow of Boston, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS.

For the Discovery of any Person or Persons, who shot into the House of Mr. Yerburgh of Frampton, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS.
